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

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

In the second the negro forced the Australian into eutral corner and dropped him for ount of nine with right and left swings to the jaw. Lang went down again for nine in the third round by right to the point of the jaw, but he ame back in the fourth and stood up and exchanged left and right swings with Langford at a terrific rate. The Australian took a long cou wice in the fifth, but despite of the heavy punishment he had reveived he carried the fight to Langford the next time up, and in a fast infighting rall, more by accident than anything else. 
