The Reciprocity Fight at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, To-Day.

The Liberals in caucus yesterday determined to continue the support of Reciprocity. This probably means a prolonged struggle. It is understood that Premier Laurier will not attend the Imperial Conference or the Coronation.

Bell Island Sanitation.

A short time ago Dr. Tait of St. John's visited some of the streets of that city, and his account of his inspection given in the daily papers excited so much comment, that His Excellency the Governor decided to visit these streets and see for himself if their unsanitary condition as pictured by Dr. Tait were real or not. If His Excellency would visit some portions of the Wabana Mines he would find conditions similar to those described by Dr. Tait, if not worse.

The dangers which may follow this deplorable state of affairs are sufficient to fill the ordinary person with dread and horror. It must be remembered that Bell Island's water supply is surface water. There are no lakes or ponds from which the supply can be drawn. The water which a great many drink has to pass over foetid and disgusting matter of the worst kind. The earth filters this somewhat, but it cannot be denied that the present unsanitary conditions open up the way to outbreaks of dangerous diseases.

Now, all this can be remedied. The Dominion Iron and Steel Co's. tenelements are supplied with a sanitary arrangement which guards against the pollution of the water supply. The company bears the expense of carrying this out. Why is not a similar arrangement adopted all over the island? Mainly because we have no form of local government, which would see that the health of the people be safeguarded.

The people last year unanimously demanded self-government, and although we were promised that their demands would be considered, still nothing whatever was done in the matter.

Something will have to be done soon. There are portions of Bell Island becoming as congested as a city and yet these places have not the ordinary convenience of the smallest outport.

We are a fairly patient people, and when the Premier announced in the early part of the session, that the question of self-government was being considered and that something would soon be done, we were willing to hold our peace for a while longer. Now that the House is closed, nothing can be done for another year, and we are told to "live horse till you get grass." Meanwhile through the gross neglect to which we are subjected, local conditions bring us nearer and nearer to an appalling epidemic of typhoid or other disease, and we have not the power, nor will the Government apparently exert itself, to prevent such a calamity.—Wabana Druggist.
