ST. JOHN'S UP IN ARMS.

**Decides to Throw Out the Tories
for Bartering Away the Rights of
the People --- Last Night's Wonder-
ful Liberal Demonstration.**

**Supporters of Liberal Party, East and West, Hold Joint
Parade—A Mass of People Took Part in the Proce-
sion—Nothing Ever Seen Like it Before—Size of
Parade Beyond Description—Streets Lined by an Im-
mense Concourse of On-Lookers—Kent, Dwyer and
Ryan in the East, and Ellis, Cowan and Scott in the
West, Popularly Acclaimed the Choice of the People
—Candidates Pulled Through the City in Carriages,
Followed by Thousands—No More Tory Ruling—
Their Death-knell Sounded.**

St. John's, the capital of our
ancient Colony, handed down its
final decision last night and will
hurl from office the Tory crowd, who are
known throughout the length and
breadth of the island for their high-
handed acts. This opinion was
conceded on all sides last night when
the joint parade was witnessed. The
people of St. John's East and West
showed their loyalty to the cause
and

Proved the Strength of the Liberal
Party as Well,

by turning out in such large numbers.
It was a wonderful demonstration, a
grand and most enthusiastic demon-
stration and a demonstration that
stands unique in the annals of poli-
tics in this country. Truly it may
be said that the size of the proces-
sion was beyond expectation. The
streets from one end of the city to
the other were filled with a mass of
human beings. It was really a me-
morable occasion for adherents of
Liberalism and a death-knell for the
Tories, who have bartered away the
rights of the people for the past four
and a half years.

The Meeting was called for 8.30.
There had been no extensive adver-
tising of it on street cars or no
agents going around with the cash.
But at the appointed hour the Lib-
erals of St. John's, exercising the loy-
alty to the true cause inherited from
their forefathers, assembled on the

historic King's Beach. Up to this
time every craft in the harbor was
illuminated and volleys of musketry
belched forth a hearty welcome. Be-
sides hundreds of outport men came
ashore from their schooners and took
part in the celebration, showing how
they rejoiced in the glorious victory
that awaits the Liberal Party. Be-
fore the parade,

Mr. Stone, the F.P.U. Candidate for
Trinity District,

addressed the immense gathering
from the Mechanics' Hall. In a
sound, practical and convincing
speech he showed up and illustrated
to the fishermen how they were un-
justly treated, and wilfully wronged
by the Morris Party. After rousing
cheers, the procession lined up. It
was a mass of enthusiasm.
Women and children joined in the
ranks. The sight witnessed of so

were fired, stage powder burned amid
continuous and tumultuous cheering
that rent the air. On returning, the
multitude of people were addressed
by the East and West End candidates
who have been popularly acclaimed
the people's choice. Each in turn
dealt with the insane policy that Mor-
ris had put before the country to

LONDON, Oct. 29.
The Empress of India, which
twenty years ago, cost \$5,000,000,
will be the target for big gun prac-
tice to-day, under the direction of
Winston Churchill. Only recently
she was ranked as a first class bat-
tleship.

NORFOLK, Oct. 29.
The battleships New Jersey, Ne-
braska, Rhode Island and Virginia,
are under orders to leave Hampton
Roads to-day for Mexico. The ships
carry ammunition and provisions for
last six months. They will proceed
with all haste to Vera Cruz, to re-
lieve the battleships now there.

DUBLIN, Oct. 29.
Larkin's plan to send the children
of the Irish strikers to English
homes has been abandoned. Arch-
bishop Walsh has started a fund to
feed and clothe the children of the
strikers. Ten thousand pounds have
been subscribed, and will be distrib-
uted by a committee of fourteen,
including three women.

BERWIND, Col. Oct. 29.
Three battles, the hottest fought
since the miners' strike began, mark-
ed the first day of martial law. One
mine guard was killed, four union
men were wounded, and two children
of non-union men were shot. One
guard is missing, and the county
Marshal was wounded.

LONDON, Oct. 29.
The Standard says that never, per-
haps, has any human being, whether
police or private individual, been so
popular with all classes in the Do-
minion as the Duke of Connaught,
whose popularity is shared by the
Duchess. It is not likely, however,
that their stay will be long. The
Standard hopes Prince Arthur may
be his father's successor at Rideau
Hall.

HALIFAX, Oct. 29.
The 100 ton schooner Yamaska,
from English Harbor for Halifax
with fish, sprung a leak off St. Pierre.
The crew escaped. The vessel went
down. Both vessel and cargo are in-
sured.

TRINIDAD, Oct. 29.
The tipple and office of the South-
western mine have been destroyed
by fire by strikers. Arms and am-
munition have disappeared from
Ladlow Tent Colony, and hundreds
of strikers scattered. The arrival of
the militia. Adjutant General Chase
will give them 24 hours in which to
lay down their arms.

NEWCASTLE, Oct. 29.
Bonar Law, on the same platform

Disastrous Fire Last Night.

Shortly before midnight, last night,
an alarm of fire was rung in from
the foot of Prescott Street, summon-
ing the Brigades to the stores of
Marshall Bros., where a big blaze
was in progress in the top flat of the
building. The fire company quick-
ly responded, and found great diffi-
culty in coping with the flames, ow-
ing to the dense clouds of smoke,
and darkness that prevented using
the hose to advantage. The firemen
were busy until three o'clock this
morning when the "all out" signal
was sent in. Spontaneous combus-
tion is said to be the cause. Damage
to the buildings is estimated at about
\$40,000, the insurance carried on the
buildings and stock being somewhere
about \$120,000. St. John's has not
and such a destructive fire since
the Bald fire which took place in
the spring of 1909.
