Disastrous Fire Last Night.

Shortly before midnight, last night, an alarm of fire was rung in from the foot of Prescott Street, summoning the Brigades to the stores of Marshall Bros., where a big blaze was in progress in the top flat of the building. The fire companies quickly responded, and found great difficulty in coping with the flames, owing to the dense clouds of smoke, and darkness that prevented using the hose to advantage. The firemen were busy until three o'clock this morning, when the "all out" signal were busy until three o'clock this morning, when the "all out" signal was sent in. Spontaneous combustion is said to be the cause. Damage to the buildings is estimated at about \$60,000, the insurance carried on the buildings and stock being somewhere about \$120,000.
