The War.

Haig's successful blow between Cambrai and St. Quentin has brought the British fairly up to the Hindenburg line, though at the moment of writing German counter-attacks appear to be in progress. The British now hold Holnon, north of St. Quentin, and the French Contes-halves; Simms, Brien Phelan, Kelly, forwards. court, south of it. St. Quentin, literail; vital to the German defence, is commanded from two sides. It has not fallen yet and it may be long before it does-witness the history of Lens for eighteen months past. One thing at any rate is certain: the battle for the Hindenburg line has opened in earnest and is not likely to end or abate until that line is broken forever and has passed into

Quite as inspiriting as these suc cesses is the news from Macedonia. This is no light skirmish on the part of the French and Serbians. It is in all probability the opening stage of the long-postponed offensive having for its object, however far distant, the elimination of Bulgaria and Turkey. The recent Italian advance in the Al banian mountains was its logical and necessary prelude, preparing the ground for a blow at the enemy's flank when the front should have given way. It has given way already. The region of the attack, just east of Monastir at the opening of the great Variar Valley, is a critical part of the Bulgarian defence system. It is too early yet to know whether the attack, if it continues to succeed, will turn east, with the object of flanking the formidable positions on the Struma, or continue ap through Serbia towards Uskub and Nish, but the latter alternative seems the more probable. Developments will soon make the point clear.

The reason and significance of this bresh offensive are to be seen in the Mport, made simultaneously, that Bulgarian troops have been moved to the western front. They will be moved back again. The Allies see a last be-

fore them that condition in the military theatre as a whole for which they have been striving since the Marne, and which they had indeed orought about in 1916 when the Russian collapse set them back again to the tarting point. The Germans con only efend their extended lines by reinroements moved laterally from one art of it to another. If the Allies are ow held up in Macedonia it will only because such reinforcements have een moved thither and opposed to them, when we shall inevitably see the effect elsewhere. Consonantly with this now obvious strategy, it will not be surprising, though at this late season it is not very likely, if the Italians should undertake a sudden offensive along the whole Piave front. Finally, no stronger proof could be wanted than this offensive of the Evening Telegram srowing weakness of Germany's military position in Russia and the east generally. AVIATORS DO GOOD WORK.

LONDON, To-day British Army and Navy aviators, in the last 48 hours, have dropped thir-teen tons of bombs on the docks at Bruges, and a German airdrome in Belgium, says an official straement from the Admiralty. In air fighting eleven German airplanes were destroyed. Five enemy seaplanes which approached the East Coast of England were driven off by four British ma-chines, one enemy machine being de-stroyed. Three hostile airplanes on a night bombing expedition were brought down inside the British lines last night, according to the official statement on aviation. Fourteen enemy machines were destroyed alto-gether and five others were driven down out of control.

ITALIAN OFFICIAL.

ROME, Sept. 18. The official communication from Italian Headquarters to-day says: North of Monte Grappa five enemy counter attacks in an effort to retake ground at the head of the Serien val-ley were repulsed. The number of prisoners taken in minor operations between Cesilla valley and Coidelorso, yesterday morning, was 442; twenty machine guns were also taken. On the slopes of Monte Nozzolo, south between reconnoitering parties; in the Ordi Valley a hostile outpost was cap-tured. The enemy artillery was partilcularly active along the Piave in the Montello Region and near Fagari.

U.S.A. GREAT ARMY.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.
An army of 4,800,000 by next July, after all deductions have been made for casualties and rejections, is what the enlarged American military program calls for. General March plained this to the House Appropria-tions Committee in discussing the new seven billion dollar army estimates. There are now about 3,200,000 men under arms said General March and the plan is to call 2,700,000 of the new draft registrants to the colors

BAD TREATMENT RECEIVED BY BRITISH PRISONERS.

GENEVA. Sept. 18. Released from a military prison in Bulgaria, sixty British soldiers, in-cluding seven officers, have arrived here in a very weakened condition. It is apparent that their sufferings had been more severe than those of Allied prisoners in Germany and Austria. One of the officers in speaking of the treatment he received, declared the Bulgarians would remain Orinetals Europeanized.
