The Power of Public Opinion.

There is a warning for Trade Unionists in the failures of the two general railway strikes which have occurred in England and in France within the past few months. One would think, looking at the matter on the surface, that of all forms of industry a general strike on a railway would be most likely to succeed. The whole country depends for its functioning upon transportation, and this can be conducted only by men of experience, some of them highly trained. So when they go out on strike it would seem to be impossible to do anything other than concede their demands and get them back to work.

But that is not what happened in England a few months ago. The whole community turned in to assist in running the trains, operating the stations, and carrying on the work of the railways. In a very few days trains were running with some regularity, although every employee on the English railway had quit work simultaneously. It was an amazing demonstration of the competence of the general public to take care of themselves and their own interests. Men and women joined in reorganising the transportation service of the country, and while there was little hope of them doing it efficiently, they were able to give a service acceptable under the circumstances.

Last week the same thing happened in France. All classes of people gave their services to keep the railways running, while the disheartened strikers stood watching, laides and professional men doing the work necessary to keep things going. All this only goes to prove that there is a limit beyond which the most closely organized body of men cannot go. Furthermore, that to win a strike the men must have public sympathy behind them. Public sentiment is the most powerful force in the democracy, and it is always on the side of the working man, if he can show that he is inadequately paid or unfairly treated.

In the past the International Trades Union movement has been aware of the absolute necessity of pursuing policies that would secure the favor of the general public. Thus arbitration is made preliminary to a strike by some of the International unions. In other ways the leaders of these bodies have shown regard for the public interest which has won for them the confidence of practically all classes of the community. We are confident that it is in this direction continued success and improvement in wages and conditions is to be achieved. The public is too big to be taken by the throat and forced to do things that it believes to be unjust. But those who take public opinion by the hand and secure its co-operation will invariably succeed.—The Sentinel.

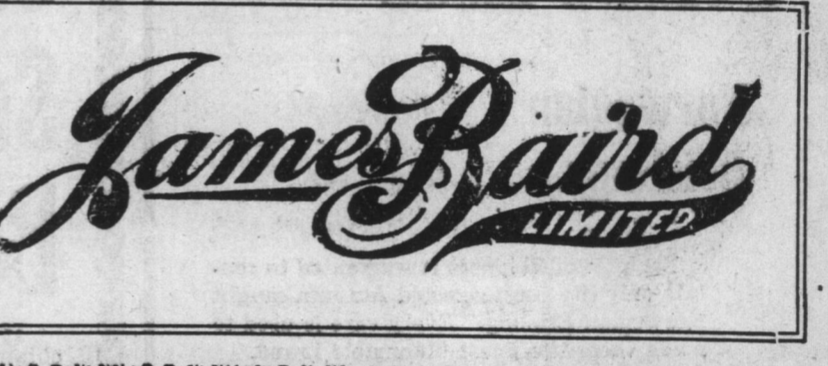
