Submarines Invented Centuries Ago. Although it was only in the recent

war that submarines played a conspicuous part for the first time, the mention of them is centuries old. Nearly 300 years ago, a workable submarine was built by Cornelius Van Drebel, a French physician, and was aunched at the beginning of December, 1620. It was propelled by oars both on the surface and beneath, and could carry twelve oarsmen. According to contemporary records it would journey for several hours at twelve to fifteen feet below the surface, and on one occasion King James I. of England made a trip in it with Van Drebel. It does not however, appear to have been used for the purposes of war. The first attempt to blow up a ship of war with a torpedo was made in New York harbour in 1773, but it was a failure. The first submarine propelled by steam was the "Natilus," built on the Seine in 1801, by Robert Fulton, and this was successful in blowing up a small vessel in Brest Harbour. Afterwards an attempt was made to blow up a British man-o'-war, but this was unsuccessful. Fulton then offered the submarine to Na poleon, but it was declined. It remained for the Southerners, in the American Civil War, to make the first successful use of the submarine, for the new Ironsides of the blockading fleet, were twice torpedoed and damaged, though not sunk, by partly submersible boats. After this, experiments with submarines were numerous, and many lives were lost. One submarine alone, after sinking repeatedly, and being raised again. was responsible for the drowning of thirty men. The persistence, coupled with stolid indifference to the probability of disaster, with which the experiments were carried out, after repeated and fatal failures, spoke volumes for the indomitable pluck and peroism of the Confederate sailors, and it is to these men that America claims, and rightly deserves the nonour of having first overcome what eemed insuperable difficulties to subwhenever you see
