She arrived of the Island this morning from Brest, with the end of the French Cable, and announced that the line is in complete working order. The shore section which was laid some days ago is now being spliced with the main cable, and before the day closes communication will pass and repass from land to land.

London, July 18.—In the House of Commons to-night Mr. Otway, Under Secretary, for Foreign Affairs, in reply to the renarks of Mr. Sykes in respect to the relations of England with China, admitted that it was to the interest of England to strengthen the central Government of that country, and not weaken it by gupboat policy and extravagant demands. He reminded the House that America and other countries had treaty rights in China as well as England. In revising the treaty of Tientzin, we must consider the probable action of other countries as well as our own demands and rights. The internal trade of the country was destroyed by British merchants selling certificates to Chinese traders, to enable them to defraud their own Government. The Chinese Government desires to yield to the wishes of the merchants, and when the Emperor attains his majority it is hoped that we shall be the tent with him on all questions in regard to the rights of trade, in that country, of English merchants.

The debate on the Irish Church Bill in the House of Lords was resumed last night. Earl Clancarty moved that a third reading be postponed three months.

Lord Clancarty's motion was withdrawn.

Earl Derby was still opposed to the Bill, but favoured the amendments.

The Bill was then read a third time. An amendment was then adopted by 80 to 82, omitting the clause permitting Bishops to retain their seats. A proviso was adopted by 121 to 114, providing furnished residences and glebes for the Catholic and Presbyterian clergy, and adopting the principle of concur rent endowment. The Bill then passed. 
