In crock butter there was 57 entries, and the quality here is pronounced to be of a superior character throughout. We of course cannot attempt to particularize, sufficient to say that almost all our noted butter makers are exhibitors, and that the fortunate ones in the class are, Mrs. J. S. Armstrong, Eramosa; John Johnston, Eramosa 2nd; and Mrs. Jas. Laidlaw, Guelph, 2nd and 3rd.
The quality of the butter in this and previous class is really so excellent that we understand it was pretty much a mere matter of particular taste that separated the successful from the unsuccessful competitors.
In firkin butter, there was an immense display, but we learn that there is a much greater disparity in the character of the butter exhibited in this class than in either of the preceding classes. Scarcely an exhibitor of note is missing from this class. For three firkins not less than 90 lbs. Thos. Waters, Eramosa, stands first, Thos. Hughes do, 2nd, John Atkinson, Guelph Tp., 3rd, Elam Vrooman, West Garafraxa, 4th do. In single firkins, Mr. John Pipe, Guelph, is 1st, Thos. Waters, Eramosa, 2nd, J. & R. McQueen, Pilkington, 3rd.
