## SILVER JUBILEE IN GAY BERLIN

Climax to Celebrations In Honor of Germany's Kaiser Yesterday in Capital

Berlin, June 18.—Emperor William's silver jubilee, which has filled the Berlin streets with the greatest, gayest crowds of celebrants ever seen in the capital, reached its climax today with visits from the allied sovereigns and

capital, reached its chimax today with visits from the allied sovereigns and closed with a gala dinner this evening, followed by a pcturesque torch-light procession of students.

The empress, although somewhat taxed by the continuous festivities, beginning with Princess Victoria Louise's marriage, was nevertheless present. The Kng of Saxony proposed a toast to the emperor, who replied with grateful acknowledgment of the loyal aid that has always been granted him by his brother sovereigns.

Torch-light processions started at 345 o'clock and occupied an hour and a quarter in passing. The students, mounted, in vehicles and afoot, wearing the vari-colored caps and ribbands and the picturesque insigniz of their corps, paraded past the castle, on the balcony of which were seated the emperor and empress and other sovereigns. The cheering was unending and the emperor bowed smilingly and saluted continuously. The visiting sovereigns started for their homes tonight.

"The day of the peeple," yesterday, in the celebration of the completion of 25 years reign by Emperor William, was succeeded today by that of the allied sovereigns of the federated states of the empire, who, inluding the mayors of the three city republics—Hamburg, Bremen and Lubreck—presented their congratulations to their colleagues at the castle.

Most of the rulers arrived in Berlin last night or this morning and gave the sens of the emperor a busy session in receiving them at the various stations. They gathered at noon in the pillar hall of the castle and then were present at a state banquest presided over by the emperor. The pillar hall is not in that state functions. It is situated in the portion devoted to private apartments of the imperial family and was chosen to enable the Empress Auguste Victoria, who is indispesed, to participate with the emperor in the reception of the German rulers.

The prince regent of Bavaria, acting as spokesman, said the emperor, as director of the foreign policy of the empire, had shown himself to be an upholder of peace and at the same time an upbuilder of the empire's might, which was the safest guarantee of honorable peace.


He praised him as the creator by his personalit, of German progress.

The prime regent then spoke of the economic pregress made during the 2b years reign of the emperor over Germany and praised his majesty as the patron of every moral, mble and beautiful impulse in the empire.

The emperor was then presented by the prince regent with a table centrepiece in the shape of a ship in massive silver as an emblem of the unity of the German rulers. The emperor h reply thanked his colleagues for their steady support during his resign. He emphasized among the other elements of progress the attention devoted to sport and the cultivation of the ideal of "a sound mind in a sound body."
