Circular Letter to the Catholic Clergy.

(Within the Diocese of Quebec.)

Gentlemen,

In my constant disposition to embrace every opportunity of strengthening the ties which attach you to his Majesty, I ought not to conceal from you, that the Loyalty manifested by the Catholic Clergy of Canada, since the commencement of the present war, has, in the name and on the part of the King, met with the most gracious approbation of his Royal Highness the Prince Regent, expressed in the most satisfactory manner by Lord Bathurst one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in his despatches of the 2d July last, which his Excellency the Governor and Commander in Chief has been pleased to communicate to me.

It is extremely flattering to the subjects to reflect, that they have merited the favour and confidence of their Sovereign. This consideration added to the motives of religion, and the principles that have governed your conduct hitherto, most amply convince me, that you will redouble your vows, your prayers and your efforts in the defence of the most precious interests of our beloved country; but more especially at an epoch, when the new motions of the enemy seem to give a more serious aspect to the American war.
