HE IS NOW A HAPPY WIFE.

A Girl Wears Male Attire for Purely Financial Reasons.

ST. RAFAEL, Cal., Aug. 8.—For about twenty years a female named Reynolds lived in this neighborhood, and later at Fairfax, about six miles from here. About two years ago the father of the family died and the mother and children again moved into town. A young man was almost constantly seen on the streets and was known by all the townspeople as Delbert Reynolds. Remarks were often made that he was a woman in male attire, and it was often noticed that he did not take any of the usual sports and amusements, and although full of fun it was often remarked that he enjoyed himself in the company of the boys and children than among boys.

Shortly after arriving here he entered the service of Wells, Fargo & Co., as an express driver. He continued to work for some weeks. After that he drove a sprinkling cart on the public streets. Then he was a carriage driver, and continued as such for some months. Last summer he was often remarked by persons who had occasion to visit the Reynolds residence that Delbert was always dressed as a girl and attended to household duties. He was a woman, and about two months ago Delbert went to Olean, presumably to work on a ranch. Nothing was heard of him until about a week ago, when ex-Sheriff George Mason came to town with the news that Delbert was a girl and had just been married to Sherbrook Hartman, and that they were enjoying their honeymoon among the hills of Olean. The report was found to be true. At a party given last night at Olean, Delbert Reynolds, or Mrs. Hartman, was the belle of the ball. Many of St. Rafael's young men were present, but she declined to recognize those who had known her in male attire. She had worn men's clothes in order to earn money to help support her mother.

Corner-Stone of the Utah University.

ODEN, Utah, Aug. 8.—The cornerstone of the Utah University, the great Methodist institution being erected here, was laid with notable ceremonies by Bishop Vincent, the famous Chautauquan. THINKS HE IS GOING MAD.

A Man Who Was Bitten by a Dog Bites His Wife.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—A man who had received a slight bite on the little finger of his left hand called at the Pasteur Institute yesterday. The hand and forearm were swollen and very painful. The man said that last Tuesday night he suddenly awoke and bit his wife in the neck. This incident put him in a distressing state of mind, and he resolved to apply for admission to the Pasteur Institute.

The man was waiting in the parlor at the institute yesterday when his mind suddenly became a blank, his face assumed a ghastly hue and his eyes protruded. He talked wildly and could remember nothing that had taken place recently. He came out of this state as suddenly as he had fallen into it and therefore talked naturally. He said he remembered losing his senses, but further than that nothing.

The dog that bit him is not mad, but the physicians at the institute think that the matter has preyed upon the man's mind until he has become temporarily deranged. His condition was not definitely determined yesterday and he will go to the institute again to-day.

Besides this man there were three other applicants for treatment. A man from this city, a little girl from Troy and one from Brooklyn. None of them were admitted. There are now eight patients under treatment.

TRADE IN THE STATES.

Less Favorable Crop Reports and Colder Money Markets Create Uncertainty.

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EMBARGO ON TRAVEL.

General Strike on the Vanderbilt Railway Lines.

The New York Central Tied Up Its Entire Length.

Passenger Trains Deserted in the Tunnel—Traffic at a Standstill—Other Labor Troubles.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—There is a strike on the New York Central railway. No trains have left the Grand Central depot at Forty-second street. The depot is crowded with people. It is reported an incoming train was deserted in the tunnel at Thirty-sixth street and the passengers were left to make their way to Forty-second street as best they could.

The Central Hudson road is tied up in Buffalo to New York. All switchmen have deserted their posts. Trains are allowed to proceed to the termini of divisions and then switch service is refused. The strike began at 7 o'clock.

THE CAUSE.

The trouble threatened among the thousands of employees of the New York Central and other Vanderbilt lines was up to the strike of the switchmen. The strike of the switchmen, broke out shortly after 7 o'clock to-night. All the length of the Central was tied up, and trains were left in their crows where they stood when the order came.

LEFT IN THE TUNNEL.

Two passenger trains were left at Buffalo to New York. One going in that direction. The latest report at 9 o'clock is that the West Shore Railroad is tied up throughout its length, as well as the New York and New Haven Railroad. Great throngs of people are crowded into the Grand Central depot trying to have tickets changed, and asking all manner of questions.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Aug. 8.—The local assembly met got through with its meeting. Orders were received from New York at 8 p.m. ordering a complete strike of the Knights of Labor on the Central Hudson system. Train 3 was the first train affected in this city. The train reached this city on its regular time at 9:45 p.m. and was abandoned by its crew of trainmen. One trainman was put on the train here and it proceeded on its way west on time.
