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The Arab Army.

Lymph.

Berlin, Nov. 20.—The lymph used by Prof. Koch for the cure of tuberculosis is prepared in an incubating stove within a space that is hermetically sealed and sterilized and thereby rendered free from fungus. The interior of the air-tight space is divided by an angled glass diaphragm into an upper and lower section. In the upper section is placed a salted meat broth in a gelatinous state, containing colonies of the tubercle germ. This mass gradually liquefies and the gelatinous plate into the lower section. The liquid then contains all the necessary products, but is free from all living or dormant germs or reproductive spores, and is the lymph as used.

Found Guilty of Conspiracy.

Dublin, Nov. 20.—In the court of Criminal Justice yesterday a verdict of guilty was rendered against William O'Brien, John Dillon and Patrick O'Brien, members of Parliament, and John Cullen, Thomas Walsh, Patrick Meehan, and Mr. Bolton, who were indicted on charges of conspiracy to induce tenants on the Smith-Barry estate not to pay rent. William O'Brien and John Dillon were each sentenced to two terms of imprisonment of six months each, but the sentences are to run concurrently. Patrick O'Brien and John Cullen were each sentenced to six months' imprisonment, and Thomas Walsh, Patrick Meehan, and Mr. Bolton to four months each. All the sentences were without labor. Father Humphreys, of the parish of St. Michael's, Dublin, who was indicted on charges of conspiracy to induce tenants on the Smith-Barry estate not to pay rent, was found not guilty and discharged.

A Plea for Parnell.

Dublin, Nov. 20.—United Ireland says: "We do not desire to condemn Mr. Parnell's previous sin, but from Ireland, which he has served so long and faithfully with such devotion and such magnificent success, he may at least look for generous forbearance in the hour of his trial. To his praise be it spoken that he has not attempted to shield himself by perjury. He yielded to a temptation to which many great and wise men have succumbed since before the days of King David. He has shown what to a man of his proud and high spirit must have been indeed humiliating and bitter. But to the Court's decision we submit the answer is sharp and decisive: 'No.' Irishmen have no mission to judge his private life. Leave that to his conscience and his God, who weighs the temptation with the offense."

A Curious Case.

Dublin, Nov. 20.—A curious case before the Dublin courts is said to be without a parallel in ancient or modern legislation. Annie Williams, an infant, through her next of kin, her mother, has sued the Great Northern Railway Company of Ireland for £20,000 damages for injuries received at a terrible Arranagh Railway accident on June 18, 1880. At that time the plaintiff was not born. She was still in ventre sa mere, as the lawyers engaged in the case have said. For the defense it was urged that the case was ridiculous, that the defendants had entered into no contracts with the plaintiff, therefore were not liable. "She certainly could not have bought a ticket," the judge suggested. For the plaintiff, counsel contended that there was a contract, even if it were an implied one, as far as plaintiff was concerned. The plaintiff had been born crippled in consequence of the accident, and was entitled to substantial damages.

Herbert Ward Castigates Stanley.

London, Nov. 20.—Herbert Ward writes to the Times: "With every desire to be loyal to Mr. Stanley, it is impossible for me to longer remain silent. Mr. Stanley has, since all the side issues of the Jameson-Bartlett stories and other matters in order to evade the main controversy. It would appear that in charging the rear guard with irresolution and disregard of instructions, he feared to charge for which he was himself responsible, as he collected all the little-tattle of tale-bearers and attacked his subordinates. After stating that Stanley's column was not above reproach and that he himself had buried dead men Stanley left on the road, Mr. Ward asks why Stanley left inexperienced officers in charge of the rear guard, and that they could only carry out his orders and drive the lead bearers with the greatest severity. 'Why had he appointed Bartlett, whom he disliked, as rear guard as Bartlett disliked him and whom he knew was unsuitable for a position of momentous responsibility at the supreme crisis of the expedition? What must be thought of Stanley turning back on Yambuya, assuring Bartlett he had made a wise choice, and selecting him to guard the interests of the expedition during his absence?' Mr. Ward declares that with all his acknowledged faults, Major Bartlett, with splendid loyalty to the best traditions of his service, held sacred every instruction of Stanley to the last. In the face of starvation he refused to open the stores Stanley had warned him were essential to the success of the expedition. Yes Stanley accused him (the Major) of disloyalty. Says Mr. Ward: 'There was no sense of food and medicine but his reason of discipline. To have taken the law in our hands would assuredly have led to bloodshed. Stanley must take a portion of the blame. By his example he marched up he initiated among the members of his staff the feeling of indifference to human suffering, and among the lead-bearers a fatalistic acceptance of their lot as mere beasts of burden. By appointing Bartlett under the circumstances he deliberately risked disaster, to use no stronger word, by vague instructions. He placed Bartlett in a position of bewildering alternatives. He put Bartlett more or less at the Arab's mercy and left him abandoned. By publishing the affidavits of a negro valet he demoralized his men. He can answer for himself whether he did not bear some of the responsibility for the disaster which befell the rear guard.'"

Novel Plan of the Baptists to Spread the Gospel.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 20.—The Baptists are to have a rolling tabernacle, a chapel on wheels, which is to travel all over the Northwest, carrying two missionaries. The original suggestion and effective advocacy of this car belongs to Rev. Dr. Wayland Hoyt, of Minneapolis. His brother, Colgate Hoyt, Chas. L. Colby, of New York, and some other gentlemen will help to carry out the plan. The contract for construction has been given to the Barney & Smith Manufacturing Company, of Dayton, O. The American Baptist Convention has accepted the car and will pay the expense of mission work. According to contract the car will be finished and delivered in Chicago March 1, 1891. The car will be managed by the Sunday school and mission work of the Minnesota of the American Baptist Publication Society.

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HEALING BY FAITH.

Strange Stories and Statements Made by a Scotch Faith Curer.

TORONTO, Nov. 20.—John Alexander Downie and his wife, whose headquarters for the present are in Chicago, and who came here to give a mission to expound "God's way of healing" within a radius of 500 miles of the Prairie City, and to establish a similar society to the Christian Alliance in Toronto, are giving a series of 20 public lectures in Association Hall. Among the remarkable things said was that the "gifts of healing" were given at Pentecost had been restored to the church, and that the lecturers had exercised them several years. They said nothing, however, about the "gift of tongues" or the "gift of prophecy." The following are specimens of Mr. and Mrs. Downie's teachings:

Mr. Downie told how he had been cured by faith in the Christian Church of a chronic dyspepsia at the age of 17, how he had thrown away the medicines of an empty-headed old physician, who was at a loss to know what to do for the sufferings of a lying boy. He had concluded that the disease was "not of the flesh" but of the heart, and that it had come from the devil.

Then he connected himself to the healing mission and had "hundreds" of cures, 14,000 persons and seen multitudes cured. This was the close of one of Mr. Downie's addresses.

"We landed in San Francisco in June, 1888, and since that time the blind have received their sight, the lame have walked, the dumb—yes, the dumb, who had never spoken—in a few cases, have spoken. The deaf, who have never heard, in a few cases from birth, have heard. In numbers of cases where I have seen people have recovered perfectly. These are the works of God's power never failing."

Mr. Downie says: "Divine healing is diametrically opposed to the disordered counterfeits of Christian Science, Mind Healing, etc., which are utterly un-Christian. These impostures are only seductive forms of spiritualism. Trances and ecstasies are also, a more recent form of this delusion and it deceives many. A Christian who overcomes with sickness should turn to God for the forgiveness of sins and for immediate healing. Cures are not to be had by the use of medicines, but by the use of God's power. The healing has in some cases extended to fractured limbs without surgical appliances." Much more to the same effect he and his wife veraciously affirm.

"Bring the sick to us and we will pray, and if they be God's children and have faith they shall be made whole. If thou dost one thing the devil can't stand it is this healing. Every boy on Job's body was made by the devil's dirty fingers."
