TORONTO, Aug. 28—11 p.m.—The depression
which was over Ontario last night moved east
to New Brunswick, causing strong westerly
winds on the lakes and southerly winds west-
ward in the Gulf and Maritime Provinces. The
pressure is highest to the southwest of the
lake region, and there is another depression
moving south-east over Minnesota.
Minimum and maximum temperatures:
Calgary, 57-74; Edmonton, 47-75; Regina, 52-74;
Winnipeg, 52-74; Toronto, 55-68; Montreal, 60-74;
Quebec, 52-72; Halifax, 56-70.

—A drinking fountain will shortly be
erected on the Market Square.

—Two drunks, one of each sex, were dis-
charged at the Police Court yesterday.

—Turnkey Ryan, of the county jail, has
just returned from a month's visit to
friends in Kincardine.

—Mr. D. McNeely and Miss George
Calver are spending a short vacation with
Miss Curry, of Strathroy.

—The case of R. D. Ross, huckster, for
violating the market bylaw was adjourned
by request until Sept. 14 at the Police
Court yesterday morning.

—Rev. Prof. Williams, M. A., Huron
College, will preach in Grace Church,
Greenway, on the evening of Sept. 2, when
a thanksgiving service will be held.

—Col. Smith, D.A.G., city, was in St.
Thomas Thursday afternoon to meet the
city engineer and camp committee and have
the camp and drill grounds on Lynhurst
staked out.

—Hon. John Dryden, Minister of Agri-
culture, paid a flying visit to Mr. F. W.
Hudson Thursday. Yesterday he made a call
on Mr. James S. Smith, of Maple Lodge,
who is a member of the Advisory Board of
the Ontario Agricultural College.

—Mr. W. P. Turner has arrived in the
city from London, Ont. He is the repre-

—City Engineer Graydon has ordered
Col. John Williams to have the pile of
abandoned telegraph wires removed from
Princess avenue removed at once. He has
also ordered J. Eyles & Sons to take their
sign down, as it projects over the street
contrary to the city bylaw.

—Miss Amy Horton, of St. Thomas,
formerly of this city, and Augustus P.
Seabrook, of Philadelphia, were married at
St. Thomas last Tuesday afternoon. Miss
Belle Wilson, of this city, was bridesmaid
and Percy Seabrook, of Delaware, groom-
man. The young couple will reside in
Philadelphia.

—Dora Swartz charged Benjamin Harris
at the Police Court yesterday with using
abuse language towards her in a public
place on Aug. 19. The plaintiff's husband
went into the box for her, as her English is
not very fluent, and stated that Harris had
on several occasions insulted his wife. The
magistrate fined him \$5.

—Ald. Brighouse, the chairman of the
Board of Works, and Mr. Thos. H. Tracy,
the city engineer, returned Thursday on
the Western Express from the tour of in-
spection of the Sound cities and San Fran-
cisco. They have both greatly enjoyed the
trip, and Mr. Tracy says he is feeling in

—Mrs. James McKee, wife of Thomas
McKee, M.C.R. paint shop, St. Thomas,
was found dead in her bedroom on Wednes-
day night by a neighbor, Mrs. Murphy.
Mrs. McKee was sitting in her night-dress,
and was kneeling beside the bed when
found about 9 o'clock. Mr. McKee left
for Chicago at 2 o'clock Wednesday after-
noon to visit relatives, his wife then being
apparently in her usual health. Mrs. Mc-
Kee has suffered from heart disease and
other trouble for some time past. An
old-time debtor of deceased is married to
George Phillips, C. T. R. engineer, of this
city. The deceased was about 60 years of
age.

—The Daughters of England, of Princess
of Wales Lodge, No. 2, the juvenile branch
of British Lion and the S. O. E. band paid
a visit to British Lion Lodge, No. 53, Sons
of England, Wednesday evening. The
regular business having been transacted,
Master Fred Nutkins was made the
recipient of a pair of fine boots for adding
the largest number of members to the
juvenile branch. Bro. Robert Simmons
made the presentation. British Lion
Lodge supplied refreshments and a very en-
joyable evening was spent by all present,
songs, speeches and music by the band mak-
ing up a good programme.

A Rather Peculiar Robbery.
A strange robbery was effected at St.
Joseph's Hospital early Thursday morning.
The loser is a man named Ryan and the
robber's name is Griffin, both being patients
in the institution. It is alleged that

Ryan's pockets, succeeded in making good
his escape. Ryan stated Thursday that
