OPEN ALL WINTER.
London, Aug. 4.—The Russian Government has decided to keep open during the winter the harbor of Vladivostok, Russia, the terminus of the Trans-Siberian railway. This harbor is closed by ice from November to May, but the government has just sent to Vladivostok two immense ice-crushing steamers like those used in keeping winter communications open between Denmark and Sweden.

TOO MUCH EXPENSE.
London, Aug. 4.—A special dispatch from Sydney, N. S. W., says that the attorney-general, Hon. John Henry Watt, Q.C., has issued a minute, protesting against the excessive and unnecessary charges to the colony of £2,000 for extraditing Frank Butler, the Australian bush murderer, from San Francisco. Mr. Watt says it would be better to let criminals remain abroad than to pay such enormous costs for the extradition.

THE TURKS WARNED.
London, Aug. 4.—According to a dispatch from Canea, Crete, the admirals of the international fleet have decided to oppose by force if necessary the entry of the Turkish squadron into Cretan waters. LAURIER ON THE KLONDIKE.
London, Aug. 4.—The Paris correspondent of the London Daily Mail has had an interview with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Dominion premier, on the subject of the opening up of the Klondike, and he represents Sir Wilfrid as declaring that the reports of the influx of miners must be greatly exaggerated. Sir Wilfrid would not say whether there would be any difficulty on the matter between the Dominion government and the United States, but at any rate there could be no difficulty on the score of frontier, as this was precisely marked and the gold fields lay within Canadian territory. "There was no doubt, however," he said, "that they ran into Alaska, and gold would be found over a vast extent of those regions. For the next fifteen years the locality would be, in his opinion, the great gold mining center of the world."

GERMANS PERTURBED.
London, Aug. 4.—Reports of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's speech at a banquet in Paris Monday night are published at Berlin, extracts being given of his utterances regarding the denunciation of the German trade treaty with Great Britain. The contents of the papers here upon the utterances are peculiar. The cheering by the Paris company of Laurier's speech, the denunciation of the treaty at Canada's instigation is noted, as is also the fact that Canada's premier is a "Frenchman." The support of Laurier's position is, therefore, drawing the conclusion that no favors to Germany may be expected from Canada with Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the head of the government. In commercial circles here, and in Hamburg, however, the order was not to be disturbed, and the denunciation of the treaty coincident with Sir Wilfrid Laurier's premiership is not considered in the light of one circumstance having anything to do with the other. It is well known in these circles that Sir Charles Tupper and his Conservative predecessors were as anxious for the abrogation of the treaty as was Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The fact that the Canadian trade treaty with the German Empire are discussed considerably. MR. CHAMBERLAIN IN EXPLANATION.
London, Aug. 4.—Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, answering a question in the House of Commons today on the subject of the denunciation by Great Britain for treaties of commerce with Germany and Belgium, said the denunciation was the unanimous wish of the self-governing colonies, who desired to deal with the United Kingdom on preferential terms.
