The trenches and hills were shelled with lyddite, and even if the Boer guns were withdrawn under cover, instead of being silenced, the ranges were obtained, positions for enfilading the rifle trenches were as-certained, and the enemy's lines of defense were disclosed.

## FOR THE BOERS

Senator Mason, of Illinois, Airs His Predilections in Congress.

Washington, Dec. 12.—Yesterday, Mr. Mason, of Illinois, addressed the senate on his resolution expressing sympathy with the South African Republics in war with Great Britain. Mr. Mason maintained that under the Monroe doctrine and on precedents previously well-established, the United States has the same right to extend its sympathy and hopes for success to the Boers as it had to interfere with Spain in its conduct of affairs in Cuba. He urged that the interest of country was aroused by the fact that

the South African war was a struggle between democracy and royalty—between the divine right of kings and the divine right of man. Referring to Mr. Chamberlain, Mr. Mason said: "Let the distinguished Liliputian statesman, rattling around in Gladstone's shoes, trying to undo his work and break his promises, be assured that he is deceiving no one, except possibly himself."

Mr. Lodge said there was a wide gulf between private opinion and public official expressions. The executive department of the government had as-sumed a neutral attitude towards the South African war. The passage of this resolution by the senate would change immediately that attitude. The resolution was referred to the
