Mr. Cuthbertson was secretary of the Presbytery of London and Samia for many years, and on his removal to Wyoming was chosen secretary of Samia Presbytery, which had then been set apart from London. Since his superannuation, he had resided with a son in Toronto. He was a life-long friend of the late Rev. Dr. Proudfoot, and had, the day before his own death written a letter of sympathy to Dr. Proudfoot's family.

HOW WOULD YOU LIKE TO BE THE COAL MAN THESE DAYS?

He Is the Most Sought After Man in the City.

The Price of Hard Coal Here and Elsewhere.

It Sells for Less Than in London in Places Near Here—The Transportation Trouble.

IF ANYONE asks Central who is most often called up on the telephone these days, the hello girl would reply, "The coal man." If, for an hour, one could be argus-eyed, and from a point of vantage watch the office of every coal and wood merchant in London, he would see more men and women enter them with anxiety written upon their countenances than approach the stores of merchants in any other line of business here. The coal dealer in London has become a personage of more importance than he has ever been before. People chase after him, as office-seekers chase after politicians, only those who want coal are prepared to pay for it. The coal man is the most discussed man in town, just as he is the greatest in demand. At the table, in the office, on the street, everywhere, one hears talk of the coal situation. When a man has no coal in his bin, and has to pay out ten and twelve good, hard, honest dollars for one ton of coal, he has something to talk about. One ton of coal means two weeks' work to many a man in this city, and when the coal shed is empty and the mercury can't get more than a few notches above the freezing point, when coal must be bought, and is bought at the present figures, where is the money to come from for the grocer, the baker and the butcher? It is this that makes the coal situation talked of, and brings it close home, not to the laboring man alone, but to most of the men who are not millionaires.

"Well, there's a load off my mind," a workman was heard to say yesterday. "I've got some coal at last." "How much did you give for it?"

Some of the dealers here say that to a certain extent the Grand Trunk is to blame for the slowness in delivering the coal that does come here. An Advertiser reporter talked to some Grand Trunk men here, men who work in the yards, and they said that the cars in the G. T. R. yards in this city have never been placed upon sidings quicker than at present.

"Supt. Costello has been out in the yards day and night for the past ten days, keeping things moving," one of them said. "We were never hustled around as we are now."

An engineer, talking to The Advertiser, said that except in an isolated case or two, no coal cars have been held.

On the other hand a coal dealer showed an Advertiser reporter today a circular from the jobber with whom he deals, announcing that no more orders could be accepted from this date. The circular was issued, not because there was a lack of coal, but because the transportation facilities were inadequate and they couldn't ship orders. So there you are!
