

Mr. Hellmuth's Address.

The trial was resumed this afternoon before Mr. Justice Magee and the jury, with Mr. I. F. Hellmuth, K. C., counsel for Hon. G. E. Foster, beginning his address to the jury. Mr. Hellmuth took exception to the method employed by E. F. B. Johnston, K. C. in talking to the jury during the morning. He did not consider that the jury was a custodian of public morals nor did he think that Mr. Johnston had any right to instruct them as to where their duty lay.

The range taken in the trial was in some respects extraordinary, remarked Mr. Hellmuth. Apparently they had been engaged in investigating the affairs of the I. O. F. and the Union Trust. . 


