

FORTY-TWO PEOPLE WERE KILLED IN AWFUL WRECK IN INDIANA!

Many Persons Were Also
Terribly Injured in
Trolley Smash.

APPALLING CRASH AT FORT WAYNE

Cars So Badly Twisted They
Cannot Be Told Apart—A
Scene of Death and
Destruction.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Sept. 21.—Forty-two persons were killed outright, and a score injured, seven fatally, in a collision this afternoon between a southbound limited and northbound local cars on the Fort Wayne and Bluffton branch of the Wabash Valley traction line. The crash occurred in Kingsland, 18 miles south of Fort Wayne.

There were two physicians on the cars at the time of the wreck. One of them escaped serious injury and with the other, who had himself been painfully hurt, rendered assistance to those who survived the shock of the collision. Relief cars were hurried from this city and physicians went from Bluffton in automobiles.

Many of the dead already had been removed from the debris of the splintered cars and the gruesome work of taking out the mangled remains of those in the further recesses of the wreckage was taken up by the more skillful hands of the company's wrecking crews.

Most of the people on the north-bound car were en route to the fair at Fort Wayne.

Help from nearby residences was rendered to such as could be removed from the wreckage.

How It Happened.
What led to the accident is not known, but it is supposed that there was a misunderstanding of orders. The car carrying the people to the fair was an extra, and it is believed that its position on the road was not definitely known, and the limited, running on its own time, was not apprised of its approach. The curve where the wreck occurred is one of the shortest on the Wabash Valley line, and there was hardly a moment after the local car was sighted before the crash came. Even the motormen on the two cars had no time to jump so close were they together when sighted.

An Isolated Spot.
The spot where the disaster took place is isolated. There was not a doctor in Kingsland, and the people of the village seemed paralyzed by the immensity of the deaths. They lacked a leader and until the relief cars from Fort Wayne and Bluffton arrived little was done to take the dead and injured from the wreckage.

It was a long, hard task to remove the victims. The dead and injured were laid in rows at the side of the tracks. Turners' wives brought sheets to cover the dead and to make bandages for the wounded. Legs and arms were severed, heads cut out, and strips were torn from the flesh of the victims. Because of the broken bones the features of the victims were terribly distorted, the bodies being entangled with the timber of the crushed cars.

To add to the horror of the scene, flies settled on the dead and injured in great numbers. All the time, pending the arrival of the physicians, the injured writhed and screamed in pain, and the crowd which gathered about them stood helpless to aid them.

Another Story.
Bluffton, Ind., Sept. 22.—D. E. Wilson, conductor of one of the two inter-urban cars which were wrecked here last night with a loss of 43 lives, tells the following graphic story of the wreck.

"I was going toward the rear of my car to get the keys from my locker with which to unlock a switch that we were approaching. This switch has a dead end, and as it was unlocked we would have run into the grounds. We were then about a quarter of a mile from Kingsland."

Heard No Crash.
"Suddenly all the stuff in the car began to pile up around me. I did not hear any crash, or any noise. Things just seemed to rise up all around me, and I could not do anything to stop them. Then I lost consciousness. I was in the grove near the wreck. I do not remember of hearing any screams or any particular amount of noise. The reason of this is, I guess, that I was somewhat out of my head. I walked back to the wreck, and saw Motorman Charles Vandine, of the northbound car, staggering around there, and grabbed him and walked down the track with him a short distance. Then we went across the field, and I do not remember anything more until someone in a house took off my hat and collar and coat and put me to bed. That's all I know about the wreck."

An Awful Wreck.
The cars were running at a very fast rate as demonstrated by a view of the wrecked cars after they had run into each other. The iron and wood of one could not be distinguished from the other, so tangled was the mass, and in this was a struggling, shrieking mass of humanity, praying, calling for help, and pleading for relief from their misery. The plans of the promoters are to make it one of the greatest affairs this city has ever carried out in honor of the Liberal chieftain.

GRAND TRUNK MAGNATES CONFER WITH PREMIER

Relations of the System With Former Employees Was Discussed.

Ottawa, Sept. 22.—President C. M. Hays and A. W. Smithers, chairman of the Grand Trunk board, and William Wainwright, held a conference this morning with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. G. P. Graham and Hon. William Pugsley. Messrs. Hays and Smithers have just completed a trip over much of the Grand Trunk Pacific line, and that was chiefly the subject of the conference. It is understood the Premier brought to the attention of the railway magnates some of the grievances he heard of in his recent western trip, and that the relations of the Grand Trunk with his former employees, who struck, was also discussed. There is no announcement of a result so far.

TWO TORONTO BOYS TRAVEL WITHOUT MONEY

Wound Up by Being Taken Care of by Children's Aid Society.

Two interesting little travellers were rounded up by Inspector Sanders and Assistant Inspector McGuire, of the Children's Aid Society, this morning. They were Willie White and Arthur Smith of Toronto.

They were found on the street, without money, and looking for work. White is perhaps 14 years of age, and Smith does not look any older.

They had come to London by the freight train route, and were somewhat dilapidated when seen in the inspector's office, after a hard night's travel. White is an orphan. His mother and father died four years ago, and the boy was left to shift for himself. The other lad had a father who had come to Canada from the coal fields of Yorkshire a couple of years ago, but was left to shift for himself. Both wanted work, and wanted it badly.

Inspector Sanders listened to their stories, and then endeavored to see that they were well looked after. They will be sent back.

FRENCH PRESS SORE ON BISHOP BOURASSA IS VERY SEVERE

Talk of Carrying Bi-Lingual Question to the Pope—Nationalist Leader Is Not Any Too Sure That Bishop Will Be Overruled There.

Montreal, Sept. 22.—The ears of his lordship of London must be burning these days, for the French press of all political colors are in hot pursuit of Mr. Fallon for having forbidden the use of the French language in his diocese.

The anger of the French-Canadians is all the more intense because of their seeing in the person of Bishop Fallon their enemy Ottawa, who kicked up such a storm around the University of Ottawa on the language question, and who was quietly removed by his bishop at the time.

It is said, however, that Mr. Fallon has kept the complete confidence of Rome, and reports go to show that Cardinal Vannutelli himself recently spoke in the very highest terms of him.

HAZING IS ENDED AT WESTERN FACULTY SURPRISED STUDENTS

All Who Attend the College Are Compelled to Sign an Agreement to Forfeit All Rights and Fees If They Take Part in Any Initiation Proceedings—"The World Do Move."

The good old days of hazing and other sophomore and freshman pranks are forever terminated at the Western Medical College. Time was when each year about ten days after the annual opening of the college, the vicinity of York and Waterloo streets, would be awakened some bright morning with the groans of bleeding, broken freshmen and the jubilant cries of over-zealous sophs.

Five years ago the initiation proceedings conducted by the Western medical students were really horrifying, and gruesome indeed were the mystic rites they engaged in within the recesses of the old college building.

MAN WANTED IN ENOS CASE RUN DOWN AT TOLEDO

Toronto, Sept. 22.—The provincial police were yesterday afternoon notified of the arrest in Toledo of Frank Jackson, a negro wanted in Chatham on a charge of murdering Jacob Enos, another negro, on the night of July 18. Inspector Wm. Greer left last night for Toledo to secure Jackson's extradition.

Three colored men, Guy Needham, John Johnson, and Frank Jackson, had countered Jacob Enos on the night in

question and in the altercation which ensued Needham was slashed in the abdomen and Enos shot through the head.

The latter died and warrants were issued for Johnson and Jackson on a charge of murder. Johnson was arrested shortly after in Detroit, and brought back to Chatham, where he is now in custody.

Jake Enos at one time resided in this city.

JOHN CORRIN'S MENTAL CONDITION LOOKED INTO

Man Who Stole Suitcases Said To Be Rather Weak.

John Corrin, the young man charged with the theft of twelve or thirteen suitcases and valises from the railway stations and different hotels about the city, was up before Judge Macbeth this morning for a preliminary hearing. He was further remanded for one week, after evidence as to his physical condition and intellect had been given by Drs. MacArthur and Waugh.

Both physicians agreed that Corrin is not in the best mental condition, which may be attributed to the fact that he is run down physically, having lost about thirty pounds during the past three months.

In answer to a question by Judge Macbeth, Dr. MacArthur stated that he is not of the opinion that it is a case of either "brain storm" or kleptomania. A term in prison would not help his physical condition, the physician said, while it might have a very detrimental effect.

Eleven of the twelve or thirteen articles stolen have been recovered by the city detectives.

P. H. Bartlett, acting for Corrin, pleaded that the young man had made no attempt to realize any money on the property, and as far as is known he has used none of it.

FRESH YOUNG MAN GAVE WRONG NAME

Rode Bicycle On Walk and Paid a Fine of Two Dollars.

This morning's session of the police court was far from exciting, a number of cases of infractions of the dog muzzling, a case of violation of the building regulations, and a couple of charges of riding bicycles on sidewalks, occupying a little of the time of Mayor Beattie.

A young man who gave a fictitious name to a policeman when accused of riding a bicycle on the walk, was fined \$2, the extra dollar being exacted from his person in order to silence the police for the trouble of locating the real man.

A half dozen cyclists who rode their wheels on the walk paid a dollar each and were allowed to go.

David Dostcher, an Indian from Muncey, was charged with being drunk. He pleaded that he wanted to go home to look after his corn, and was discharged.

William Forester, drunk and disorderly, was warned to keep to the straight and narrow, and discharged. Two cases against citizens charged with allowing dogs to run at large unmuzzled, were adjourned until Oct. 19.

City Architect Nutter laid a charge of violating the building regulations against William T. Mortimore, but the case was adjourned sine die.

Bourassa Severe.

HERE'S LIBERTY HALL FOR THE BURGLAR MAN

Chicago Citizen Has the Doors Open and Glad Hand Ready.

Chicago, Sept. 22.—Henry Nell, secretary of the National Probation League, does not believe in lock and key, to keep out burglars, and has had all such safeguards against the intruder removed from his residence.

"If the right hand of fellowship was extended to burglars instead of the kick and threat, the world would be better, the penitentiaries would be emptied in a short time, and there would be no need of lock and key, bolt and bar," said Mr. Nell.

MR. BECK ANSWERS THE COUNTY COUNCIL

Says That All the Information Possible Was Furnished in Regard to Sanatorium.

Hon. Adam Beck disputes the assertions of the county councillors in regard to the county and the London Health Association sanatorium.

"I do not desire to enter into any controversy in this connection," Mr. Beck stated to The Advertiser, "but I think that in justice to the directors of the sanatorium some errors should be corrected."

"It is claimed that the association did not give the information that was asked for by the councillors in reference to the care of patients. I may point out that on several occasions the directors waited on the county council and gave all the information that was asked."

"In fact, the councillors were given the same information that resulted in the city of St. Thomas and the County of Elgin making an agreement with the association for the care of tubercular patients. Not only did the directors furnish all the information possible on the subject, but they also had Dr. Bruce-Smith wait on the council and explain the sanatorium scheme to the members."

"It will also be remembered that at the June session of the county council the directors took the members to the sanatorium in automobiles, and they were shown over the place and the entire scheme was explained."

"It is said that nothing definite could be learned in regard to the care of incurables. I might say that it is a matter of general information that the Victoria Hospital trust, on which the county has a representative, voted to provide for the care of incurable tubercular patients."

"So that there was no need of worry on that score. And it is a significant fact that there is not now, and has not been since the sanatorium was opened, a single incurable patient in Victoria Hospital."

"The County of Middlesex profits by the decision of Victoria Hospital to take care of incurables, whereas the County of Elgin and the County of St. Thomas do not, yet the latter were ready to come in on the sanatorium scheme, and make provision for their tubercular patients."

A LENGTHY PETITION FOR WILLIAM HAYS

Young Man in Jail on Serious Charge Is Not a Professional.

A very lengthy petition was presented in behalf of William Hays, the young man charged with stealing a very good reputation from a Pere Marquette car, who appeared before Judge Macbeth at the court house this morning, and was further remanded for one week.

Hays has borne a very good reputation previous to the offence with which he is charged, and over 250 citizens signed the petition in his behalf.

THE SHIPMAN ESTATE.
Toronto, Sept. 22.—The will of the late John E. Shipman, who died in this city, formerly of Owen Sound, filed today for probate, leaves the entire estate of \$35,000 to the widow, Mrs. Mary Shipman. This amount includes cash in the bank, \$15,224; bank stock, \$14,300, and life insurance, \$5,000.

CRASH IN FOG.
St. Charles, Mich., Sept. 22.—Conductor Wm. Clements and his helper, C. G. Doty, of a Michigan Central Switch engine, were perhaps fatally injured today when their engine which was standing at a switch here, was struck in the rear by a southbound through freight train. The accident occurred in a dense fog.

NIAGARA POWER DELEGATES MEET TO CONSIDER WINDSOR'S REQUEST

BERLIN MAN ARRESTED CHARGED WITH THEFT

Charles Burkett Said to Have Stolen \$600 in That City.

Three hours after a brief description contained in a telegram from Chief O'Neil, of Berlin, was handed to the local detectives yesterday, telling of the theft of \$600 in that town, Detectives Downs and Egelton placed under arrest Charles Burkett, aged 27, said to be a German.

Burkett will in all probability be taken back to Berlin by officers today. The arrest was made in a Richmond street cafe shortly after 3 o'clock yesterday. It is said the prisoner has been in this city for several days.

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SIX MONTHS FOR CARTER

Young Man Who Burglarized St. Thomas Store Sent to Central.

SHOOTS GIRL; SUICIDES

Tragic Windup to a Detroit Joy Riding Party.

Cleveland, Ohio, Sept. 22.—An hour after he had been arrested and confined in the county jail for shooting a young woman, whose identity is unknown, P. W. Yates, who is believed to be from Detroit, Michigan, committed suicide by hanging himself in the washroom of the jail today.

The shooting, which caused Yates' arrest took place in a Detroit car on a roadhouse at Rocky River, just west of this city, early today, following a day and night spent in riding about the city in an automobile, and in visits to wine rooms.

In the man drawing a gun and firing at the girl. She was hurried to a hospital and is in a serious condition. Yates had considerable money in his pockets.
