JOSEPH KELLY
DIED OF INJURIES

London Cigarmaker Had Leg
Cut Off in the West.

Joseph P. Kelly, the London cigar-
maker, who was badly injured about a
fortnight ago, in Hammond, Indiana, by
being struck by a train, died in St. Mar-
garet's Hospital in that city Saturday
evening as a result of the injuries. It
was thought for a time after the acci-
dent that he would recover, but it seems
the shock has been too much for him
and he gradually became weaker until
death followed. The late Joseph Kelly
left London a little over a month ago
to take a position in Hammond. He was
returning from work one evening when
struck by the train. His legs were so
badly mangled that they had to be
amputated. His wife, formerly Miss
Mary Corson, of London, resides at 754
Walker street, East London. The re-
mains will be brought to London for
burial. Richard Kelly, of Chicago, a
brother of the deceased, having left yester-
day to bring the body back. Besides his
wife, the late Mr. Kelly is survived by
two daughters, Olive and Luella, one
son, Joseph, and a brother, Richard, of
Chicago. Mrs. Thomas Hevey, of Min-
neapolis, a sister, also survives. The
funeral arrangements have not been
arranged as yet. It is expected that the
remains will arrive on the M. C. R. this
morning.

JOHN H. CHAPMAN
DENIES THE STORY

Merchant Is Not Negotiating For
Bowling Alleys on Dundas
Street.

The story in circulation that J. H.
Chapman would take possession
of the National Bowling Alleys in the
near future is denied by Mr. Chapman,
who stated that he is not negotiating
for the premises.

"We are settled for a time at least
where we are," he stated. "We are not
negotiating for the National Bowling
Alleys, nor do we intend to."

regarding T. Eaton & Co., Toronto.
There is a report every year that this
firm will open up a branch in London,
but nothing is ever done.

In a dispatch from Toronto, Mr. J. C.
Eaton, president of the company, de-
clines that the company ever intended
that they have no intention of leasing the
National pool rooms.

THERE'S NO RUSH

OF CANDIDATES

But There Will Be Many Con-

tests for Municipal Offices

Here.

BUT A FEW WALKOVERS

But in Most Cases There Will Be Bat-

ties to a Finish.

With the municipal elections just
seven weeks away, there is little stir,
and the candidates are not appearing
in any large numbers.

There will be a contest for the
mayoralty. The two names most
prominently mentioned are those of
Ald. W. J. Stevenson and ex-Ald. C. M.
R. Graham, and it is practically certain
that both will run. Ald. Eckert has
also been urged by a large number of
citizens to contest the mayoralty. He
has not made up his mind as yet, but
it is more than likely that he will wait
for another year. Ex-Ald. Donald Far-
guson has announced he will run in the
field, and will probably remain there.

The Council.

There will be a big field in the alder-
manic race. Practically all the present
body will run. It is certain that Ald.
Cooper, Mitchell, Saunders, Morgan,
Wilson, Donnelly, Ashplant, Bennett,
and Richter will run. Ald. Tancock
and Ald. Eckert are considering the
master, and it is quite likely that both
will go to the polls.

Ald. Stevenson is the only absentee
from this list, and he will likely take a
stand in the mayoralty. Other candi-
dates are appearing. Ex-Ald. G. E.
Rose is definitely in the field. Others
mentioned are M. J. O'Donohue, W. H.
Eaton, and others. It is expected that many more will
announce themselves within the course
of a week.

Water Commission.

It begins to look as if Chairman
Philip Pocock and Commissioner J. H.
Chapman will have a walkover for the
third time. Some time ago,
Ald. P. G. Mitchell announced that he
would run for the commission, but af-
ter considering the matter carefully he
has come to the conclusion that he
would prefer to remain in the council.
He, therefore, will remain with that
body. No other candidates for the
commission are appearing. If Mr. Pocock
and Mr. Chapman run there will be no
opposition, it is thought.

Hospital Trust.

The same will be true of the hospital
trust. Mr. Meredith, the retiring
member, was selected about six months
ago, owing to the resignation of P. M.
Judd, and there is no suggestion of

Cold at New York.
New York, Nov. 12.—The cold wave
that chased into the Atlantic some of

the balmy Indian summer weather
New York ever has enjoyed, tightened
everything up today, and sent the
mercury down to 34 degrees. This
minimum, recorded at 8 o'clock this
morning, meant a fall of 44 degrees
since 1 o'clock yesterday.

The gale on which the frigid weat-
her rode into town, continued today
with a wind blowing 38 miles an hour.
Few small boats ventured into the sea out-
side New York harbor, and reports of
marine disasters are expected. The
high winds have crippled the wire ser-
vice, and telegraph lines to the west
are doing business only with great
difficulty.

Tornado in Michigan.

Marshall, Mich., Nov. 12.—A tor-
nado passed over Calhoun County late
last night, causing damage to farm
property estimated at \$125,000. A
score of barns were demolished, live
stock was killed, and several dwellings
were unroofed. So far as is known no
person was killed or seriously injured.
The temperature has fallen 50 degrees,
and a heavy wind and snow storm
prevails.

Tennessee Catches It.

Chattanooga, Tenn., Nov. 12.—A fall
of 40 degrees in the temperature was
recorded in Chattanooga within three
hours yesterday. A severe wind and
rain storm caused damage in all parts
of the city. Late last night the tem-
perature was 31 degrees, and falling.

Norther in Texas.

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 12.—The norther,
which swept over Oklahoma and Texas
Saturday afternoon and night, brought
the coldest weather for this date in 20
years. At Amarillo, in the Texas Pan-
handle, the thermometer showed 10
above zero yesterday, breaking all pre-
vious records. Much cotton in the
fields was blown to the mills and lost.
