Bulgar and Greek Drifting Into War

London, April 22 .- Bulgaria and Greece are rapidly drifting towards war over the possession of Saleniki, according to the Chronicle's correspondent at that town.

The Greeks have mobilized every available soldier and concentrated one army in the neighborhood of Saloniki, while another is being landed at Orfani, in the Gulf of Orfani, in order to watch the move-ments of the Bulgarians at Drama and Kavala. The victorious Epirus from Janina is being d.stributed along the new strategical front from Saloniki to Orfani.




