Bulgar and Greek Drifting Into War

London, April 22.—Bulgaria and Greece are rapidly drifting towards war over the possession of Saloniki, according to the Chronicle's correspondent at that town.

The Greeks have mobilized every available soldier and concentrated one army in the neighborhood of Saloniki, while another is being landed at Orfani, in the Gulf of Orfani, in order to watch the movements of the Bulgarians at Drama and Kavala. The victorious Epirus army from Janina is being distributed along the new strategic front from Saloniki to Orfani.

In the meantime, adds the correspondent, the Bulgarians have suspended passenger traffic between Dedagatch and Saloniki, and are utilizing the railway for the concentration of troops in the neighborhood of Drama, close to the Greek position. They have already brought one division each from Adrianople. The Greek army facing it is estimated that the Bulgarians now have 90,000 soldiers facing the Greeks, and the Serbian force, supporting the Greeks, which is assembling along the railway north of Saloniki and on the right bank of the Vardar River.

GOVT. FEARS LIB. CRITICS WANT TO PROROGUE NOW BUT MR. ROWELL IS FIRM

Toronto, April 22.—Desperate efforts are being made by the Government to "break down" the Liberals and have the Legislature prorogued this week. It is not usual for work to be laid out for committees on Monday, but yesterday morning the public accounts had a three-hour session. The House then started and continued sitting until nearly 2 o'clock this morning. There was plenty of business and plenty of talk. The Government members have suddenly become loquacious and are anxious to tire their able opponents across the floor.

Opposition Firm.

Again this morning the public accounts committee got to work and sat continuously until the House began, when automatic adjournment forced the members to desist. There is a lot more work to be done, and contrary to all precedents, the Opposition is not letting up. The criticism against the Government is just as vigorous and exhaustive as it was when the session started three months ago. A number of important matters are yet to be dealt with, and the investigation of public expenditures along with the disclosure in connection with Taylor, Scott & Co.'s contract may produce a discussion that will call the members back again next week. The stubborn refusal of the majority on the public accounts committee to allow Mr. Proudfoot proper scope in his examination will precipitate an appeal to the committee on privileges and elections, which is something that a Government with a majority of 45 in a House of 105 might care to avoid.

TWO LOCOMOTIVE "JOY RIDERS" ARE PLACED UNDER ARREST

Toronto, April 22.—The "joy-riders" who took a C. P. R. engine from Guelph Junction on Sunday afternoon and went for a wild ride into Guelph, 14 miles, where they ran into an open switch, and collided with a freight engine, have been caught.

Two C. P. R. men, Hugh J. Craig, station agent at Guelph Junction, and Orville Fletcher, watchman, were arrested by Chief Detective Wm. Frost, of Toronto, and Detective C. P. Holden, of London, and locked up in Milton jail.

South Huron License Commissioners Cut Off Three Hotel Licenses.

Dangerous Fire at Vancouver, B. C.

Vancouver, B. C., April 22.—A dangerous fire, starting from a clearing plant on Point Grey, for a time threatened the whole of the fashionable residential district. A gas blowing at the time carried the sparks broadcast, and every roof within a radius of a mile had a corps of watchers brushing off the sparks. The home of A. E. Millington was destroyed and others damaged. Loss, \$20,000. The fire spread to a great pile of lumber, and thousands of spectators thronged the district watching the spectacular conflagration.

MILITANTS IGNORED

Petition for the Vote Presented to Parliament on Behalf of Suffragists.

London, April 22.—Lord Robert Cecil, in presenting a petition in the House of Commons tonight in favor of the enfranchisement of women, was very careful to explain that the militant suffragettes, or the members of the Women's Social and Political Union, had not signed it. It was presented on behalf of the twenty-seven societies of women who were opposed to the methods of the militants. Lord Robert's appeal was greeted with cries of "Never, never." Sir Cosmo Lang, the clerk of the House of Commons, afterwards read the petition.

LIFE IMPRISONMENT INSTEAD OF HANGING

Effort Will Be Made to Have Henry Love's Death Sentence Changed.

Owen Sound, April 22.—Life imprisonment for Henry Love, recently found guilty of the murder of his wife, and sentenced to hang, will be asked from the Minister of Justice by Love's counsel, W. H. Wright.

Love, it is alleged, has repeatedly tried to gain possession of a knife or something sharp, and his guards have the impression that he is either contemplating suicide or is going to try to dig his way out.

Love still maintains his air of unconcern and is reported to have discussed with his guards several times the hanging, which will take place unless his sentence is changed by the Minister of Justice.

WOULD PUT MILITANTS IN SAILING SHIP

Novel Punishment Suggested by Judge in Sentencing Picture Smashers.

Manchester, England, April 22.—In sentencing two militant suffragettes, Mrs. Forrester and Miss Manesha, at the Manchester assizes, today, Justice Sir Eldon Barker said "I would send you around the world in a sailing ship if the law permitted me so to dispose of you."

The women were brought up at the assizes for trial on the charge of raiding on April 3 the Manchester Art Gallery, and smashing the glass of thirteen famous pictures, which they said they did as a protest against the sentence of three years imposed on their leader, Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst.

The judge declared that failing the remedy he suggested as a cure for suffragette militancy, he would have to send them to jail for three months and a month respectively, and they would have to serve additional terms of six months and four months, respectively, unless they found sureties for their good behavior on leaving jail.

KIPLING AS PLAYWRIGHT

His Comedy, "The Harbor Watch," Produced in London.

London, April 22.—Rudyard Kipling made his debut as a playwright at a matinee at the Royalty Theatre, today, when his comedy, "The Harbor Watch," was produced. The play is practically a transcript of his "Bonds of Discipline," one of whose minor characters, the drunken marine, Paddy Glass, becomes a hero. The piece is full of Kipling's humor and kept the audience laughing. The critics predict that it will be a success.
