This practice provides the opportunity for serious loss, for which the postal service is fre-quently blamed. The public is hereby notified that the postoffice department will not consider parcels left on top of parcel receptacles and street letter boxes as being posted, and any loss which occurs in this manner is a matter entirely outside the jurisdiction and operation of the postal service. A postoffice department memorandum says:

"Commencing on 15th November, 1921, letter carriers shall carry for sale a stock of postage stamp books sufficient to meet the demands of purchasers on their routes."

FIRE DESTROYS

Victim Falls to Death After Clinging to Window Ledge.

New York, Nov. 14. - Ten lives were lost and more than a score of people injured in a fire of unknown origin, which partially destroyed a five-story tenement house on West 17th street before dawn today. The building was occupied by fifteen families, mostly Armenians and

Nine were burned to death and the tenth died in a fall from a ledge, where he had clung until exhausted.

Five bodies, all unidentified, were found huddled together near a doorway on the fifth floor of the building, and firemen state there are four more bodies in the

Investigation by firemen showed the fire had originated in the basement and roared up the airshaft to the second floor. where it "mushroomed," spreading through the four upper stories of the building. The fire had gained a good headway before being discovered, and when the firemen arrived the flames were pouring out of the windows of the second and third stories.

Many of the people who lived in the tenement groped their way to windows, where they clung to ledges and screamed for One man became exhausted


