Mr. Biggs' address was chiefly devoted to describing the importance of county and township roads as distinct from the provincial system to the country at large, and the refutation of certain criticisms which had been made that the Province was not providing sufficient mileage of good main roads.

"Up till two or three years ago," he said, "township roads were an unknown quantity. Today they are Renfrew coming into prominence. The motor ear was given credit for bringing about the change

"We must try to keep the amount of work that is undertaken within the proper bounds of the taxpayer at present. Above all, always look to the permanency of the road." To this end he said it was becoming more apparent that the one great essential to road permanency was adequate drainage.
