**BACK HAY AS LEADER**

**SEEK TO INSURE**  
**WATER SUPPLY**

STRATFORD, Feb. 27.—At a meet-  
ing of the board of health, Secretary  
W. H. Dorland was instructed to  
draft a resolution from the board to  
the public utilities commission  
suggesting that steps be taken to  
install necessary machinery to insure  
pure water for the citizens in case  
of any future breakdown in hydro  
power. The recent storm interfered  
with Stratford's general water sup-  
ply, necessitating the use of river  
water.

**WEATHERS HEAVY**  
**ATLANTIC STORM**

ST. JOHN, N. B., Feb. 27.—After  
being buffeted about fourteen days  
by mountainous seas and high winds,  
the Canadian Pacific steamship  
liner Minnedosa arrived in port this  
morning from Liverpool and docked at  
Squad Point.  
She had 227 cabin and 303 third-  
class passengers, 500 bags of royal  
mail and 2,000 tons of general cargo.  
Passengers said that from the time  
they left the Irish Sea until they  
reached Sable Island the seas were  
mountain-high, and some of the  
largest combers swept over the  
decks.

## BIGGS REFUTES ROAD CRITICISM

Declares Province Has Pro-  
vided Sufficient Mileage  
of New Highways.

**DEFENDS DRAINAGE NEED**

Charles Talbot of London  
Suggests Repeal of Section  
of Road Law.

TORONTO, Feb. 27.—"Last year  
was undoubtedly not a year of least  
performance or of least improve-  
ment," said Hon. F. C. Biggs, minis-  
ter of public works and highways for  
the Province of Ontario, in address-  
ing the eighth annual conference of  
country road superintendents and  
engineers at the Parliament build-  
ings today.

"A great work has been carried  
forward by the Province, the coun-  
ties and the townships, and the re-  
ports which are coming in indicate  
the progress that has been made,"  
he declared.

Mr. Biggs' address was chiefly de-  
voted to describing the importance  
of county and township roads as  
distinct from the provincial system  
to the country at large, and the re-  
futation of certain criticisms which  
had been made that the Province was  
not providing sufficient mileage of  
good main roads.

"Up till two or three years ago,"  
he said, "township roads were an un-  
known quantity. Today they are  
coming into prominence. The motor  
car was given credit for bringing  
about the change."

**Defends Permanency.**  
"We must try to keep the amount  
of work that is undertaken within  
the proper bounds of the taxpayer at  
present. Above all, always look to  
the permanency of the road." To  
this end he said it was becoming  
more apparent that the one great es-  
sential to road permanency was ade-  
quate drainage.

Turning again to the prevalent  
impression that moneys expended  
by the provincial department were  
all devoted to the provincial system,  
Mr. Biggs denied this.

"You will imagine, from some re-  
ports that appear in the press," he  
said, "that all road expenditures are  
made on provincial roads. The im-  
pression is wrong. More money was  
spent last year on the construction  
of county roads than was spent on

## EXPECT TO FREE BULLOCK FRIDAY

Canadian Authorities Still Await Ar-  
rival of Witnesses from  
Norlina.

**CITE JUDICIAL QUESTION**

Washington Officials Declare Counsel  
Can Be Retained In Do-  
minion.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 27.—  
The extradition from Canada of Mat-  
thew Bullock, negro, wanted in Nor-  
lina, N.C., on a charge of attempted  
murder, is "a judicial question and  
in contested cases state authorities  
not infrequently employ counsel in  
Canada," acting secretary of the  
state department, today informed  
Governor Morrison.

Secretary Fletcher's telegram,  
which was in reply to a wire from  
the governor, stating that the state  
would not send witnesses to Canada  
to testify in the hearing an extradi-  
tion of Bullock, was made public to-  
day.

The reply which was dated Febru-  
ary 25, follows:  
"You may desire to take into con-  
sideration that by treaty with Great  
Britain, which is applicable to Cana-  
da, it is provided that extradition  
shall be granted only upon such  
evidence of criminality as, according  
to the laws of the place where the  
fugitive, or person so charged, shall  
be found, would justify his appre-  
hension and commitment for trial  
if the crime or offense had there  
been committed."

"This, of course, raises a judicial  
question and in contested cases state  
authorities not infrequently employ  
counsel in Canada as do likewise  
Canadian authorities in the United  
States, where occasionally extradi-  
tion cases go so far as the United  
States Supreme Court."

Department officials said that the  
case of Bullock was in the same sit-  
uation as last Friday when the mes-  
sage from Governor Morrison stat-  
ing his refusal to send witnesses to  
Canada was received and that Bul-  
lock will be released by the Cana-  
dian authorities Friday morning  
unless witnesses appear against him  
from this country.
