At Toronto.

Nov. 9.—From the number of replies which have been received by Secretary Dulmage of the O. B. A. A., there is every indication that there will be a large attendance at the special general meeting to be held at the Carleton Hotel, Toronto, on Saturday afternoon next, commencing at 2 o'clock. Delegates are expected to be present from every affiliated league, as there are important matters to be dealt with. Perhaps the most important of these is the proposal to compel every affiliated league to adopt the January first residence rule. Heretofore each league has had a residence rule of its own, and the results have been that teams have been carrying several ineligible players, thus greatly weakening the league. It is expected that there will be some opposition to the change, but it will be at least thoroughly thrashed out. The status of the professional coach on which the A. A. U. of C. has asked for an opinion, and this will resolve a question. Some of the newer affiliated leagues are of the opinion that there will be an election of officers at this meeting, but this does not take place until the annual meeting in April next.
