### IN CANADA TO PAY U.S. British Government Not Favorable to Building Up Dollar Reserve Here. Associated Press Despatch London, March 6 .- The British gov ernment does not look favorably upon

a plan which has been suggested for building up a dollar reserve fund in Canada for the purpose of meeting interest payments on Great Britain's debt to the United States. This was intimated in the House of Commons today by Captain Henry King, junior lord of the treasury, who declared it was the opinion of the chancellor of the exchequer, that the only possible way for Great Britain to meet her United States debt was to provide liquid resources in the United States. His statement was in answer to a question whether, in order to assist
