

## WELLS HAS CLOSE CALL RIDING IN AIRPLANE

Famous Writer Flirts With Death in Terrific Gale.

London, Dec. 29.—H. G. Wells, famous novelist and historian, and Count St. Aulaire, French ambassador at London, while travelling across the English Channel Friday in a commercial airplane, Friday, were caught in a terrific storm and nearly lost their lives.

The plane suddenly ran into a gale which was of such velocity that the pilot could make no headway and the engines began to fail. Fearing that the machine would be tossed into the sea, the pilot managed to turn about and the distinguished passengers were then carried with great velocity toward the English coast, where a landing was finally effected.

Accounts reaching here are that both Wells and the French ambassador conducted themselves with real coolness, but consider their lives were saved by narrow margin.

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## MANY BIRDS SPEND WINTER IN DISTRICT

List Unprecedented in Size Presented by Members of London Club.

Each year, on or about Christmas Day, from California to Nova Scotia, and from Florida to Alaska, bird lovers go out for one grand day and take a census of the birds of their district as far as may be. These records are published in the February number of Bird-Lore, and they enable one to see with a fair degree of accuracy what the bird population of any particular district is for the present winter. This scheme began with a few beginnings are usually small—but now there are so many reports sent in that the magazine is unable to use them all, and those that overlap too much, or that seem unimportant are omitted. London has for a long time contributed a club list, made by a number of parties in the field, on a given day. This year we had parties out in the Springbank district (several of them), at Coldstream, and near Brynston, and the result was a list of unprecedented size, and with some very rare records included.

Ducks—Only one species, Goldeneye, though a duck seen was suspected to be a Merganser, but not identified. Four Goldeneyes. Grouse, 1: Red Tail Hawk, 1; Red Shouldered Hawk, 1 (another seen a day or two later 6 miles distant). Owl—Longeared, 1; Great Horned, 2; Snowy, 1; Screech, 1. Woodpeckers—Downy, 22; Redbacked, 8; Red bellied, 2; Flicker, 2. Total, 35. A good showing for the family. Blue Jay, 20; Crow, 48; Meadow Lark, 7, all feeding in the road together and very handsome. Bronzed Grackle, 1. Sparrows—Purple Finch, 33; Red Crossbill, 2; Goldfinch, 4; Pine Siskin, 101; Tree Sparrow, 37; Junco, 107; Song Sparrow, 6; Chewink, 2, both males, living in the same woods where we found them on Dec. 3; Cardinals, 9. Mocking Bird, 1. The first ever seen in London, living on the premises of one of our members, where it may be seen at almost any time. It is feeding on various berries, and seems quite contented, though rather shy to strangers. This is the second record for Middlesex, and there are records for twenty for Canada.

Winter Wren, 1. A very rare winter visitor, in spite of its name. Brown Creeper, 4; White Breasted Nuthatch, 28; Chickadee, 58; Golden-crowned Kinglet, 21. Grand total, 33 species, 542 individuals. This year practically finishes the work for 1922, and the next event is the starting of the list for the New Year, which usually gets a big send-off on January 1.
