Newmarket, Ont., Sept. 28.—Defence of the Canadian National Railway, coupled to expression of his belief that the permanent cure for the deficit-productive situation lay, not in amalgamation of the two great systems, but in "putting on a genuine scheme for filling up our vacant spaces," formed the basis of the speech made here tonight by Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways, to North York electors in the interest of Premier MacKenzie King, who is again Liberal nominee for the riding.

Hon. Vincent Massey, newly appointed minister without portfolio, and candidate for the riding of Durham, speaking from the same platform in support of Mr. King's candidacy, described the impending federal contest as a "war of ideas underlying the very future of this country, not a mere struggle between two groups of men and women bearing the party labels of their ancesters."

No unity can be achieved by attempting to fit this country into the straight jacket of a high tariff."

CANADIAN SUGAR EXPORTS **ENJOY TREMENDOUS BOOM**

Dominion Ships Almost Three Times As Much Refined Product in August As in Month of Previous Year.

Ottawa, Sept. 28.—An increase of 22,397,900 pounds, or \$1,252,857 in value, is shown in the export last month of Canadian refined sugar, as

compared with August, 1924. The total export of this commodity in August, according to a statement just issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, was 36,744,600 pounds, with a valuation of \$2,254,671, as against 14,346,700 pounds, valued at \$1,091,824, in August, 1924.
