

## MAINTENANCE HIGH IN OXFORD'S JAIL

Average Cost Per Prisoner 14.83 Cents a Day For Past Quarter.

### PRICE OF HOGS DROPS

Woodstock, Oct. 26.—The average cost of maintenance in the Oxford county jail for the past quarter has been 14.83 cents per day, according to the report of Sheriff McGhee, handed out today. This is a high average for the local institution and is due to the fact that the attendance in the jail for a large part of the time was down almost to nothing, while the overhead cost went on just the same. According to report the majority of the prisoners were farmers and laborers.

### Sentence Suspended.

After Alex. Green had pleaded guilty in court today to a charge of forgery, Judge Wallace expressed the view that prison terms seemed to have had little effect in reforming Green and decided to try him on suspended sentence. Green pleaded that he was drunk at the time of forging a check for \$125, and the judge, in giving sentence, pointed out that although the accused had served terms in the penitentiary and reformatory totaling some 25 years, it

did not seem to do any good. The crown attorney was not inclined to press for severe punishment, and the judge decided to try the effect of letting Green go on suspended sentence, with the understanding that he pay the costs of the case, amounting to \$50. Green had been in jail since Aug. 31, awaiting trial before the judge.

### Hog Price Drops.

On the local livestock market today the price of hogs dropped 25 cents a cwt., \$11 being the price paid. Calves remained at 9 cents per pound. Four cars of hogs and two cars of cattle and calves were shipped to Toronto.

### Few for Advance Poll.

Little interest is being shown in the advanced poll for railway work-ers and commercial travellers, which was opened here this evening. There are very few electors in the city who are eligible to vote at this poll.

### No Half-Holiday.

The retail merchants of the city decided today that there would be no half-holiday on the day of the federal election. The merchants had canvassed their employees, the majority of whom had expressed no desire for a half-holiday, and facilities were provided for allowing them to vote.
