Charred Remains of Man Found on Queen Charlotte Islands.

Queen Charlotte Islands. Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 17.—(Special.) —Messrs. Macleod, Law, Raper and Swinburn, passengers on the steamer Tees, which arrived from the North to-day, say that on the east side of Mores-by island, the southernmost of the Queen Charlotte group, they found the char-red remains of man whose body evident-ly had been burned until nothing but the skull and bones were left. From the appearance of the skull the remains were those of a young white man, the forehead high, the teeth small and white. Those who discovered the re-mains believe murder was committed.
