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NEWS FROM THE RAILWAY TOWN.

Moncton is Dry Under Scott Act as Now Enforced. Interesting Discourse.

MONCTON, May 3.—The Scott Act continues to be enforced and will as long as the services of Chief Ridout are retained by the city.

Dr. Andrews of Mount Allison gave a very interesting discourse before the Canadian Club on Friday night on the value of economy in citizenship. Some good wholesome advice was given to an appreciative but not very large audience. It is a great pity why the young men of this city do not avail themselves of the privilege of further enlightenment by listening to the many instructive addresses which the Canadian Club treats its members to from time to time.

At the central Methodist church yesterday afternoon there was a very interesting discussion by the men's League in regard to children. Mr. J. T. Hawke led in a fine address on "A Price for the Children." Mr. Hawke advocated that a great deal of the juvenile crimes were caused by the

lack of parents attending to their responsibility over their little ones. Corporal punishment is all right when deserved, and judiciously applied. Parents should see their children attended school faithfully, and not uphold them in disobeying the teacher. Compulsory education should be adopted and enforced. The discourse was listened to throughout and a resolution of thanks passed and Mr. Hawke was asked by the unanimous vote of the audience to publish his address. After discussion by other members of the league they also decided by unanimous vote to ask the city Council to adopt compulsory attendance at school.

It is rumored here that the Ocean Limited will go on about June 5th. Rev. C. W. Corey, who has so acceptably filled the pulpit as pastor at the First Baptist Church during the winter, will sever his connection with this church soon to accept the pastorate of a church in British Columbia.

COUNCIL APPOINTS TOWN MARSHALL AND OTHER OFFICERS.

Lengthy Meeting Held Tuesday Evening and Much Business Transacted. Questions Asked. Water Rates Discussed.

NEW DUMPING GROUND.

The annual meeting of the Town Council was held in the Council Chamber Tuesday evening, May 3rd. His Worship Mayor Murray and the full board being present.

The clerk read the application of A. Ferris and Jas. H. Pitt of St. John for positions on the police force, also an application from Chas. B. Gray for the position of Town Marshall. These were referred to the Police and License Committee.

His Worship notified the council that he had been served with a writ in an action for damages at the instance of Oliver Bourdrie, and that the case would be tried at Dalhousie in August.

On motion of Coun. McDonald the Town Solicitor was instructed to take the necessary steps to defend the case. His Worship also notified the council that he had been served with a notice of appeal from the decision of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick in reference to the Local Option election at the instance of Ferdinand Belanger and Henry Cormier.

The motion of Coun. Miller the town solicitor was instructed to take the necessary steps to defend.

Applications for granting licenses were read from Messrs. Wm. S. Young, Geo. Dunn, Geo. Math, Adam LeBlanc, J. Arthur O'Keefe.

Messrs. R. S. Chandler and P. S. Martin made application for auditing the accounts referred to police and license committee.

Applications for licenses for pool and bowling alleys were read from Messrs. W. R. Hiddell and Scott & Marquis. Referred to police and license committee.

A petition was read from the residents of Lansdowne street praying that the council would without unnecessary delay repair that street and put it in a reasonable condition. Referred to public property and streets committee.

On recommendation of Councillor Whitehead the Police and License committee licenses to do business were granted to Annet Aved for a grocery store and Mr. Hanna Chary for a general store on payment of \$10 and \$20 respectively.

On recommendation of chairman department accounts were passed. Coun. McDonald, Chairman of the Water and Sewerage Committee reported that the estimated cost of extending water and sewerage systems being built for Mr. Crowley would be \$1,000.00.

Coun. Mowat did not think that it was necessary at the present time to put in such a permanent system. A smaller pipe and connection with some other street might cost less.

The matter was held over for more information.

The following town officers were then appointed: Deputy Mayor—Councillor A. McLeod. Ex-Officio County Councillor—Coun. Mowat. Town Clerk—John T. Reid. Town Treasurer—S. H. Lingley. Town Solicitor—Trueman & McKenzie.

The rate of payment for water charged the S. S. Canada received some attention and on motion the rate was fixed at \$2.50 per trip instead of \$2.50 as formerly.

The matter of providing a suitable dumping ground was also up for discussion. The lease of the present lot expires June 1st and could not be renewed.

The matter was referred to the Public Property and Streets Com. Coun. White asked when the town accounts would be issued and His Worship answered that they would be out very soon.

Coun. McNicol gave notice of a motion which he would move at the next meeting of the council to the effect that the engineer and firemen of the fire engine be paid by the hour for all work performed instead of a stated salary as at present. He said the fire engine was used very little now owing to the increasing pressure in the water system, and he thought it would be a saving to the town.

On motion it was decided to fix all salaries of town officers at the next meeting of the town council. The council then adjourned.

SIR WILFRED AND MR. GLADSTONE.

London Journal Says There is Striking Resemblance Between the Two Statesmen

LONDON, May 4.—The Times says Sir Wilfrid Laurier's insight is equal to his great experience. He has never been excelled in clearness of vision and the felicity of his phraseology, wherein on Tuesday he outlined the relations between the British governments-general system and national self-government Laurier speaks on all constitutional topics with something of the fervor and imagination of Gladstone.

AGAIN OFF HIS BASE
The Tribune's editor in his report of the Council proceedings says: "Councillor McDonald then suggested the rate for steam boilers be lowered. He said the work could be done much quicker when the new four-inch pipe was laid down to the wharf. The steam from the present two inch pipe (which was the size of the Tribune's water motor supply pipe) was only a dribble, and the men attending the service were kept there entirely too long waiting to give the vessels the necessary water, whereas with the new four inch pipe proposed to be laid much time would be saved and the work would be done much cheaper, and in consequence the town could lower the rate and make just as much money out of it."

See the stress he puts on the size of the Tribune's water motor supply. If Coun. McDonald had been properly quoted or if Mr. Crockett had consulted engineer Black (if he wished to be fair) he would have told his readers that the pipe supplying vessels at the government wharf is only an old one inch pipe, very much corroded and nearly filled with rust, that it runs five hundred feet before it reaches the water motor and after runs one hundred and fifty feet through rubber hose to the vessels' tanks. No wonder the water runs slowly.

There is no comparison even if there were a two-inch pipe, between this service and the Tribune's supply, which has only a few feet to run from the town main, and consequently has little friction to overcome.

Water will be turned off the whole town from 4 a. m. on Sunday, May 8th, and turned on at 8 a. m. the same day to make connections.
