GREAT FUTURE FOR BAY CHALEUR

Beautiful Scenery Will be Great Inducement When Good Roads are Built.

Dalhousie, April 8.—The activity displayed by The New Brunswick Tourist Association, for future work in our province is timely. To make their efforts apply to the whole of New Brunswick, is a move that must ultimately bring great results. In St. John think that their city and a few surrounding places are the only attractive spots to draw tourists and health seekers in so far as New Brunswick is concerned. They have little idea of the beautiful spots to be found fronting the famous Bay of Chaleur and Restigouche River.

The same thing can be said of many people of the cities of Quebec and Montreal, who look down on the people who reside in the Gaspé Peninsula with pity. Gaspesia is to them some outlandish place. They try to discourage the poor fishermen. Outlanders have little idea of what a beautiful country exists on both sides of the Bay of Chaleur and Restigouche River. The accusers fail to understand the true meaning of the word happiness. Yes, grand is nature in this part of Canada, and the action of the New Brunswick Tourist Association, coupled with the efforts that are being made by the Bonaventure and Gaspé Board of Trade, we can look for important improvements being made in this one of the finest sections of God's country.

The great movement being made by the leading men of Matane, Bonaventure and Gaspé, towards opening up the three counties with new roads, etc., which so far has received the encouragement of the Federal and Quebec governments, must interest the people of Restigouche County, especially those who inhabit our two towns. Of course the town of Campbellton, with its exceptional geographical position, occupies a most important position. It cannot be far distant when a permanent structure shall span the Restigouche, between Dufferin and Matane Points, to permit of the growing and prosperous population of Gaspesia, and to comfort the town of Campbellton, which is bound to grow and become a great centre of trade, etc.

The link in the chain of progress that is missing now, in so far as Campbellton is concerned, is a bridge, to join the town with the nearest point opposite. This would mean a wonderful advantage to the farmers of the western part of the province, and the delegation which appeared before the Dominion Government, on the 22nd inst., was headed by Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux and Dr. Lemieux, the members for the County of Gaspesia, Co. N. B., plus Michoud, M. P. for Restigouche and Madawaska Counties, Hon. John Hall Kelly, P. M., Hon. John Hall Kelly, P. M., Hon. Charles MacNeil, M. P. for Bonaventure Co., A. F. Carter and Hector Hoy, of Cape Chat. All the delegates spoke in their turn and were delighted with the reception given them by Hon. F. B. Carvell, Minister of Public Works.

It is stated that this is the first delegation of this nature that ever went to Ottawa representing the population of these distant regions. A photograph of this important group was taken in front of the entrance of the Parliament building.

NO PERMANENT STREETS NOW

Citizens Voted Against Issue of \$20,000 Bonds for this Purpose.

On Saturday last a vote was taken to ascertain whether the ratepayers of Campbellton were in favor of an issue of \$20,000 bonds to pay for permanent streets. The qualification for such a vote was an assessment of one thousand dollars and there were 488 qualified voters in town. Of this number only 108 voted, which showed a great lack of interest on the part of the citizens.

Of the 108 votes cast 64 were against the issue and 44 in favor.

The consequence of this vote is that Campbellton will have to put up with a disgraceful Water Street for at least one year.

It is the general opinion that the vote was sprung on two quickly and that no means of setting the matter intelligently before the citizens was taken.

Many look upon the vote as not adverse to permanent streets, but as a vote of censure for the old council.

Paul Dufault, who was very heavily spoken of for the office of Mayor, has on hand a rock crusher and steam roller for which it has no use.
