A letter from the Separate School Board stated that in their opinion the Separate Schools of the city ought to be exempt from water rates, as the children were rated in their own homes. This struck the committee as a novel proposition, with the exception of Ald. W. Carlyle, who said a third of the population of the city were rated twice. The people in his own shop were all rated at their homes, and he also claimed exemption. The letter was referred to Superintendent Hamilton.

This action on the part of the committee met the thorough disapproval of Chairman Gowanlock, who accused the majority with being "lobbled." This was indignantly denied by Ald. McMurrich and Crawford, who claimed that they had a perfect right to hear the statements of aggrieved parties. Ald. Crawford was sorry that the chairman of the Waterworks Committee had so little dignity as to suspect any alderman of such a mean act.


