Taking his figures for quantity, 2676 cubic feet per second, the velocity could not exceed 2 feet per second, and requir-ing a cross section for the canal of 1368 feet ; that is a cBannel, say 138 feet wide at top, 96 feet wide at bottom and 12 feet deep. If this waterway is reduced in area materially, with the velocity in-creased, a very large loss of head would result.

The Government report was construed as bearish to some extent; the exports were light, and Argentine Consular advice on the Argentine crop was bearish. Weakness in corn affected the market somewhat. Nov. corn was a feature again, and was weak under local selling, which took it from a premium over May to a discount under it. Provisions showed some strength; buying by leading packers. 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
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
