### GOLDEN WEDDING.

Tuesday, January 8th, was a day of gladness at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Archibald Hay, of Chandler, Mich. Here, surrounded by brothers and sisters, children and grandchildren, was celebrated an event that comes but once to the home of any, and few there be to whom it is vouchsafed that once. It was their golden wedding, the fiftieth anniversary of the day when Archie, a sturdy, young Scotch Canadian, led to the altar as his blushing bride, Miss Elizabeth Thomas. It was noticed by those present at the celebration that though Mrs. Hay had passed through fifty summers of wedded life, her cheeks still wore the bloom of health and the blush of modesty.

Archibald Hay was born at Lanark, Ont., July 15, 1827. He moved to Warwick, Ont., with his parents, in 1835. Here he was married January 8, 1857.

Mrs. Hay was born in Warwick, January 28, 1837. Here she spent her childhood and here she grew up a healthy, happy, care-free, pure-minded, young woman. In her early maidenhood was begun a romance which led to her being happily married at the age of 19.

Mr. and Mrs. Hay, concluding that it meant a life-long struggle to bring up a large family and to secure a home in a country where land was so dear, gathered together their few belongings and together with their family of little children, came to Huron county in 1878. The same year Mr. Hay settled his family in a little log house on two acres of clearing on a 160 acre farm in Chandler township. Here Mr. and Mrs. Hay live today with one son and one daughter in one of the most modern brick farm houses in the country, on one of the choicest farms in the state, fitted with up-to-date machinery and stocked with thoroughbreds, from chickens to cattle.

After an elaborate dinner, Rev. Rob. Hay, of Watford, Ont., delivered a very interesting address, in which he reviewed many of the intellectual, social and world changes that have occurred during the last half century.

A. W. Hay, of Bad Axe, then read the following address:

"TO MR. AND MRS. ARCHIBALD HAY:  
DEAR PARENTS—Your descendants and friends are gathered in your pleasant home on this fiftieth anniversary of your marriage to express to you their kind congratulations and wish that you may both see many returns of this day. We congratulate you on the fact that you have been spared by a kind Providence to see this day; that your children are all living so near you that you can frequently see them, and that they have all been able to be present in your home on this glad day. We gratefully recognize the kind hand of our Heavenly Father that has been over you for good these many years, bestowing countless mercies, not the least of these the fact that, by His grace you have been able to walk these many years in the fear and love of Christ. As a small token of esteem and love permit us to present to you this purse of gold.  
"May you be spared to reap in your old age the reward of an industrious and virtuous life.  
"In life's darkening evening may you see with increasing brightness the resplendent City of Gold, the Christian's Eternal Home."
