34, 47 Vic., "An Act to amend the Weights and Measures Act of 1879, which reads as follyws: -"4. The following is added to the said section twenty-six as sub-section two

"Every hermetically sealed package o canned goods, such as fruit, vegetables, fish and the like, shall have the weight of the contents of the tin, can or package containing the same, legibly marked on it; and any packer or other person found guilty of selling or exposing for sale such goods in any such tin, can or package, on which the weight of the contents is not marked, or on which such weight is misrepresented, shall for the first effence incar a penalty of two

dollar. for each such tip, can or package, and for each subsequent offence a penalty of not less than three nor more than twenty dollars fer each such tin, can or package. This section shall only come into force on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.'

BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS.

Description of the Building. We are pleased to note the improvement of Calgary in its general development, as regards the superior class of buildings now in course of crection, and amongst others we have seen the plans for a Swiss Chalet for Henry Bleeker, Esq., which will be built on the cast side of the Elbow River, and standing as it does in its grounds on the

banks of the Bow, will form one of the mos

pleasant and delightful residences in the

The extent of the building will be 70 feet by 24 feet, with rough masoury foundation and basements full size of the building, to contain heating and ventilating apparatus for the entire building, and water tank contain about 80 barrels of water, to be obained from the roof. The principal entrance will be by a verandah from the east side, leading into a conservatory, which have been trapping and hunting for the past serve as a porch in winter season. The game scarce. drawing-room is of considerable extent, being 21x12, not including bay wind we, which run from the ground to the roof.
