here bring into comparison, Thompson having wrote nothing of the nature of his ethics or fatires. It may be faid that their comparative merits, even in description, cannot but with difficulty be ascertained, the one having wrote in blank verse the other in rime. It is true that Thompson has the advantage of not being fettered by rime, but to excel in blank verse, in my opinion, requires a far more poetical fancy as well as greater strength of imagination than are requisite to please in rime, where correctness of numbers often passes on the generality of readers for every thing. I cannot avoid making this avowal however it may operate against myfelf.

Before I began this Poem I read Pope's Windfor-Forreft and Dr. Goldfmith's Deferted Village, with the view of endeavouring, in fome degree, to catch their manner of writing; as fingers in country-churches in England, to use a fimple mufical comparison, modulate their tones by the prelusive found of a pitch-pipe. How far I have succeeded I must leave to my readers to determine; trufting, however, for a favourable decision more to their good-nature than to my deferts.
