Two produce market has been more active during the past to Both fleur and grain have been in good demand, a prices have gone up considerably. A few U.S. millers have be in the market looking for fall wheat, and a few cars were boug at advanced prices for their market. There was also some enqui for spring wheat for shipping.

Flour.—The market has gradually advanced, until to-day \$7 was freely offered for good brands. The stocks in the hands dealers are very light, not exceeding 2,500 bbls. The dema was principally speculative, though several lots changed hands shipping. Some holders are now asking as high as \$7.25, thou good brands are selling at \$7 10.

Whest.—There has been a good demand for both spring a fall, and prices have advanced considerably. Stocks in the han of millers are light; the demand for spring was principally to su ply their wants. Fall wheat was bought for shipment to the United States, quite an extensive demand having sprung up the for that grain. In both spring and fall wheat an advance of has taken place. The latest sales have been at \$1 55 for sprin and \$167 for fall. The receipts on the street market have be very light, hardly enough to establish quotations. Spring whe from farmers' waggons sold at \$1.55, and for fall as high as \$1 was neid.

Oals.—The receipts have been considerable; prices, however have remained steady. Car loads have been selling at from 5 to 53c. To-day the highest price that could be got was 52c. the street market there has been very little coming in. The fo loads brought in sold at from 53c to 55c.

Barley-The demand for barley still continues. Brewers a lightly stocked and are paying higher prices for their supplies th were ever before known in this market. Yesterday a large brought \$1 07, and to-day a car sold at \$1 06; for good sample \$1.05 has been freely paid; on the street market as high as \$1 has been paid.

Pess.—There is nothing doing in this grain, and prices rema nominally unchanged, namely 70c to 72c. There have been receipts on the street market.

Bran-Scarce; nominally worth \$20 by the car load.

Fork-Mess pork is in better demand, owing to the short su ply in the market caused by the light character of the hogs ti son. Sales have been made at from \$18 to \$18 50. Prin mess nominally unchanged.

Becon-Dull and difficult of sale. No heavy transactions ha taken place during the week. Held at from 7c to 71/3c for Cur berland boxed.

Lard-In rather better request. Sales have been made at fro 9c to 9%c.

Dressed Hogs-The supply has been large. Those offering me feir sale at from \$6 to \$510, for light, good bacon hogs, and from \$5 80 to \$6 25 for extra choice mess hogs.

Butter-The market has experienced a change since our le report, and closes decidedly dull for anything but choice dair which sells readily for local trade or export at from 18c to 20 Common or ordinary store-packed, nominally, 13c to 15c, but buyers at these figures. Large rolls in good demand for export from 150 to 16%c; ib rolls retail 2)c to 24c.
