The steamboat United States left Cleveland for Buffalo, with 30,000 pelts, and 100 tierces tallow. It is estimated that about 70,000 sheep have been slaughtered here the past season, mostly

for their pelts and tallow.

The lawless men on the Hudson River who have refused to pay the rents of their lands, and in the disguise of Indians resisted all the constituted authorities, have at last murdered a man named Smith, whom they took from his waggon and wantonly shot. This deed has aroused public opinion (which hitherto foolishly sympathized with them) so strongly against them, that they will doubtless be effectually put down. Already armed forces are con. centrating upon them from all quarters, and several of the ringleaders are arrested.
