Mr. Pickersgill: 1. The tonnage of silver concentrate exported to the United States in 1962 was 935 tons, which contained 2,803,300 troy ounces of silver. In addition, impure silver bullion containing 668,111 troy ounces of silver and weighing about 25 tons was exported to the United States.

The total amount of unrefined silver exported in 1962 to the United States in all concentrates, including those of lead, copper and zinc as well as of silver, was 6,751,273 troy ounces.

5. Silver mine producers, in common with other mine producers, are eligible for certain allowances in computing income tax. These include a 3 year tax exempt period for new mines, deferred write-off of preproduction expenses and an allowance for depletion of the ore body.

As was announced on February 1 in the House of Commons, the Royal Canadian Mint reached an agreement with Cobalt Refinery Limited to deliver from 2 to 6 million ounces of silver per year for five years, effective April 1, 1963, at competitive prices to be determined by negotiation every year the agreement is in force. This long term purchase contract provides encouragement for the production of silver in the Cobalt-Gowganda area of Ontario.
