### RURAL AIRPORT DEVELOPMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE ACT

MEASURE TO ESTABLISH COMMITTEE

**Mr. Frank Howard (Skeena)** moved that Bill C-102, respecting the establishment of Rural Airport Development Advisory Committees, be read the second time and referred to the Standing Committee on Transport and Communications.

He said: Mr. Speaker, the action just taken with respect to the preceding bill probably should apply to this one as well, and if the House would extend that generosity I would be glad to sit down. However, I think that probably would not be the case.

A policy has existed within the Department of Transport for a long period of time to make grants in aid of airport development to municipalities which have airports or airstrips. The standard amount of annual allocation for a number of years has been \$2 million, except for 1972 when it was increased to \$3 million for that year only. Because the then minister of transport had his eye on an election in 1972 we thought that the extra million was to be applied in areas where it might do the most political good, but the amount has been cut back to \$2 million and has remained there. At any given time the department has probably 60 or 70 applications for \$2 million, but the
