ABOLITION OF CERTAIN ESTABLISHED PROGRAMS TO GIVE JOBS TO YOUNG PEOPLE

Mr. Carlo Rossi (Bourassa): Mr. Speaker, I might say in passing that the Hon. Member for Duvernay (Mr. Della Noce) ought to do something constructive instead of beating his gums in the House. He should look after his riding instead of making empty statements in Ottawa.

Yesterday, Mr. Speaker, the Minister of Employment and Immigration (Miss MacDonald) told the committee that the First Chance Program has been scrapped. Launched by our government, this program was designed to help youths find jobs and add experience to their *curriculum vitae*.

On the eve of the International Youth Year, we are rightfully concerned about Canadian youths, because not only will those looking for a first job be penalized by the Progressive Conservative government, but so will others seeking summer employment since the Progressive Conservatives have also axed the Summer Canada-Student Employment Program which enabled thousands of our students to work during the summer. EMPLOYMENT FUNDING OF WINTER WORKS PROJECTS

Mr. Ernie Epp (Thunder Bay-Nipigon): Mr. Speaker, I rise this afternoon to call upon the Government to provide a large increase in the funds granted for Winter Works projects. Many of us were concerned about the announcement in September by the Minister of Employment and Immigration (Miss MacDonald) that only \$200 million was to be allocated for this winter's projects. Allotments of only \$100,000 for many ridings are clearly inadequate in the present circumstances of high unemployment. Grants of more funds for other ridings are just as inadequate when one recognizes that unemployment figures are underestimated because of the Government's refusal to use all of the information available to it.

The people of Canada have now been informed that the applications for Canada Works projects total \$1.2 billion, or six times the funds allocated for such job-creation projects. Clearly the supply of potential employees and of valuable projects is very large, and the new Government has equally clearly underestimated the need. It is imperative that the funding decision of September be reconsidered and the Progressive Conservative Government authorize a large increase in funds for Canada Works. If it does not, we shall all shortly be rejecting entirely worthy projects in our ridings across the country.

REQUEST FOR PROGRAMS TO PROVIDE DURABLE AND PERMANENT JOBS
