YOUTH UNEMPLOYMENT

Mr. Howard McCurdy (Windsor—St. Clair): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Employment and Immigration.

When declaring 1985 International Youth Year, the United Nations warned of the potential for explosions among unemployed and alienated youth. We have had youth disturbances now in Canada—in Toronto, Halifax and elsewhere—to which the Ontario government has responded by initiating an emergency job program for youth.

Is the minister and his government prepared to join with Ontario and other provinces in initiating an urgent program for job creation for youth this summer in order to respond to the deep concern about the potential for a long, hot summer?

Hon. Pierre H. Cadieux (Minister of State (Fitness and Amateur Sport) and Minister of State (Youth) and Deputy Leader of the Government in the House of Commons): Mr. Speaker, obviously nobody is pleased with certain developments that have led to violence in this country and other countries around the world. I am sure nobody condones that.

With respect to this government's programs for youth, my hon. friend will admit we have had programs in place for a long time. We are very pleased that the provinces are ready now to do their part in order to help us find jobs for those students during the summer.

Mr. Howard McCurdy (Windsor—St. Clair): Mr. Speaker, Manpower Temporary Services indicates the job situation this summer will be the worst since 1982. Meanwhile, this government is spending only 70 per cent as much money now as it was in 1989 for summer youth employment.

With an unemployment rate among youth already at 17.7 per cent and going up this summer, it is more important to have action than rhetoric. Will this government act to introduce an emergency summer program for youth with the urgency it deserves before there is more trouble in this country?

Hon. Pierre H. Cadieux (Minister of State (Fitness and Amateur Sport) and Minister of State (Youth) and Deputy Leader of the Government in the House of Commons): Mr. Speaker, the Canadian people agree they prefer action to rhetoric; that is why we are on this side of the House and the hon. member is on the other side.

With respect to statistics, Statistics Canada has indicated recently that students have better chances of finding employment this summer than they had last summer. Notwithstanding that, we have increased the Challenge Program this year as we did last year.
