First, that creation is at present in bondage, the evidences of which are the presence of sin, suffering, sorrow and death in the world; that creation is subject to hope as a mitigation which anchors the world to God and the unseen, and that creation shall Itimately be set free. The bishop pointed out the notes in

the epistle and gospel for the day, which determined the selection of this Sunday as humane Sunday, and said that here and in old land doubtless over 10,000 sermons would be preached that day in the interests of dumb animals. Speaking of the war, the bishop referred to the Blue Cross movement as in affiliation with the society, and drew a striking picture of the wounded war horse left to its sufferings on the blood-drenched battlefield. It was for the relief of this noble servant of man that this movement of mercy existed.


