NEW KNCX COLLEGE FORMALLY OPENED

Keys of Most Beautiful Building of Kind in America Handed Over.

HONORS FOR MINISTERS

Degrees Conferred Upon Number of Well-Known Dignitaries.

Since Knox College was instituted in 1844 there has been no more auspicious moment in its history than yesterday morning when J. K. Macdonald hand ed over the keys of the magnificent new building to Sir Mortimer Clark, chairman of the board of trustees, giving to the Presbyterian Church of Canada what is acknowledged as the most beautiful building of its kind in

With the buildings laid out on the plans of Oxford and Cambrige, they represent the last word in the colle-giate Gothic style of architecture. It was a representative gathering that witnessed the handing over of the keys and the consecration of the new building to Canadian Presbyterianism. Men who are prominent in the theological, academic, professional and political life of Canada, besides outstanding figures in the theological life of the United States, were present.

The beautifully appointed college chapel, altho not fully completed, gave an idea of what the appearance will be when operations are finished. Principal Gandier conducted the dedication service, giving thanksgiving for God's guidance in the affairs of the college during its history of 71 years. Rev. Malcolm McGillivray, moderator of the general assembly, preached the dedication sermon, giving a message of cation serifon, giving a message of know hope for the future progress of Know College in the service of God.

Sir John Gibson led the procession from the college library to the chancel

and choir loft of the chapel. He was followed by Hon. W. H. Hearst, Provost Macklem of Trinity, Prof. Watson of Queen's and other prominent mem-bers of the Presbyterian and other

churches of Canada.

Cause For Rejoicing.

"After years of prayer, toil and sacrifice I think the heart of every professor, student and friend of Knox College will rejoice with the open of the new college," said Principal Gandier when the exercises were held in Convocation Hall yesterday after-noon. "The prayers on our lips are not empty ones." Modestly forbearing to mention his own share in the work, the principal gave credit for the new

nearly perfect as any building could well be. "I doubt if any theological nstitution in the world, built for institution in the world, built for a similar purpose, has such perfect buildings," said Dr. Gandier. To the alumni of the college and all those who have aided in the cellection of the half million dollars necessary to complete the structure, the principal tendered the heartfelt gratitude of the Canadian church.
