RAISE FOR MAGISTRATES GIVE UP DIRECTORSHIPS

Col. Denison Will Receive \$5000
and Mr. Kingsford \$3000
for Whole Time.

The attorney-general introduced his amendments to the statute law in the legislature yesterday. There are twenty sections, the most important of which are:

The salaries of the two police magistrates of Toronto are increased. Col. Denison will have \$1000 added to his present stipend of \$4000 a year. Mr. Kingsford will receive \$3000 a year in place of \$1500, as at present. They are required to devote the whole time to the office and are debarred from holding office as director of any company.

Judges of the exchequer division may be put on the rota for trying election cases.

Members of the legislature are not disqualified by reason of the holding of offices of companies holding public contracts.

Extra money may be paid to civil servants for special services.

The lieutenant-governor in council may appoint or dismiss clerks or bailiffs of the division.

Constables attending assizes or sessions will get \$2 a day, an increase of 50 cents.

Judges of district courts will get \$500 a year from the province in addition to salary.

The companies to which the Companies' Act applies are defined.

A peace officer may arrest persons violating the automobile regulations without a warrant, and take them before a magistrate.

SENATE HELPS MURDERERS IN GETTING NEW TRIALS

Albany, April 27.—The senate passed a bill amending the criminal code so as to permit a person whose conviction of murder has been affirmed by the court of appeals to appeal again to the highest court and get a new trial, on the ground of newly discovered evidence.

Under the provisions of the bill Albert T. Patrick, convicted of the murder of William M. Rice, might secure a new trial if he could find the lower courts.

Cobalt Will Move.

The marvelous mineral wealth of Cobalt is drawing the attention of the world, but wonder at its unexampled millions of silver and the rush for a share of the rapidly growing industry is no difference of opinion amongst those who know the situation, that the present town of Cobalt can never meet the wants of the rapidly growing community. Mining towns are notoriously the result of accident, and are just as likely to be up and down as crossways. Old timers have no hesitation in saying that although Cobalt was the deliberate choice of the government it is "the worst yet."

The result of this must be that the town will move to a more convenient locality. The North Cobalt Land Corporation, Limited, have bought the only available level land in the neighborhood and are laying out six hundred acres in lots as small as one acre.

The future City of Cobalt will stand, and those who are wise enough to invest in lots as small as one acre are placed on the market are getting assured value for their money now and in the future.

DRUGS MUST BE LABELED.

Albany, April 27.—The senate today passed the "Anti-Narcotic" bill of Senator Stevens, requiring the labeling of patent medicines containing more than a certain percentage of alcohol of the so-called "habit-forming" drugs.

ROBBERS BIG HAUL.

Tiffin, April 27.—A band of robbers in disguise of soldiers robbed the treasury at Dushet, near Tiffin, yesterday of \$117,500.

Locomotive Blown Up.

Harrisburg, Pa., April 27.—J. F. Good, engineer, was killed and O. H. Lefevre, fireman, and J. J. Wallower, brakeman, were fatally injured today by the explosion of an eastbound freight locomotive.

The theory is advanced that the engine struck a stick of dynamite, accidentally dropped along the tracks.

Phone Manager Dead.

Albany, April 27.—Henry E. Hawley, general manager of the Hudson River Telephone Co., died suddenly this morning.

AN EDITOR'S CRIME.

Publishes Resolutions of Political Club Which Are Libelous.

Oswego, April 27.—In the supreme court at Pulaski to-day Frank M. Cornell, editor of The Fulton Patriot, was convicted of criminal libel in publishing resolutions adopted by a political club. He was sentenced to pay a fine of \$300 or go to prison for 40 days. The resolutions were directed against Co. Judge Merrick Stowell, the Republican leader, and were adopted at the time he was a candidate for the office of state excise commissioner.

BUILDING A MODEL CITY.

TO HOUSE 100,000 WORKMEN

Chicago, April 27.—The stupendous work of building a model city to accommodate 100,000 people was begun yesterday, when 100 woodcutters were set at work clearing a 6000-acre tract on the shore of Lake Michigan, in Lake County, Indiana.

The largest steel mills in the world are to be built at a cost of \$10,500,000, and the new city is to accommodate the toilers of the mills.
