The Modern Miller says of the crop situation: "Rains have interfered with the winter wheat harvest in many localities, whiter wheat harvest in many localities, notably in the southwest. Reports are received from Kansas of wheat becoming over-ripe thru delay in cutting. Farmers take every advantage of favorable weather to cut and thresh wheat, and this work is progressing, notwithstanding in-terruptions. Some of thethreshing re-turns from Southern Kansas, where the worst damage was done by bugs and frost and drought, show yields of one-third to one-half of last year's crop."

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

This new building will occupy a block of property, fronting 100 feet on King-street, and running back 405 feet on the north boundary of Stanley Park, to Wellington-street. The King-street frontage will be occupied by a two-storey brick and stone building, containing the offices and storerooms, and thru which a large centre entry will lead to the arena, which is immediately back of the office building. The arena will be 100 feet square, and will have a seating capacity to accommodate 1000 people. The roof of the arena will be supported by eight steel arches, rising to a height of 55 feet. Back of the arena is some 100 feet by 32 feet, allotted to hitching space, harness rooms, wash trays, etc., tc., from which run three alleyways, with 50 stalls on each side, giving accommodation for 300 horses. The Exchange will be much the largest in Canada, and will be so built that the stall accommo-
