Sir.—I have been a resident in Quebec for the last six months only, but in that short space of time, I have had my feelings almost, I may say, daily shocked to witness the brutality of the east drivers to their horses, in the way of over-loading and beating them. Any person may satisfy themselves of this fact, by simply standing an hour only on the side-walks in Mountain-street; and he will see more brutality and cruelty exercised to the poor horse than I venture to affirm, takes place in any English or American city of four times the size of this in one day. The dreadful loads of wood, in most cases wet and heavy, heaped up, and which the poor animal is agonized to force him to draw up the long hill, are absolutely terrible to look upon. Certainly, there must be some law to prevent this imminent and shameful abuse. Why at once is not our Police street-patrol strictly commanded to arrest offenders; and prevent the eyes and feelings of passers-by being shocked by the spectacle of horses being horribly mauled by pieces of fire wood taken from the load they fail under in drawing: or, if a pony struck and knocked out by blows from the hounds of whines; or tongues cut in twain by the fiendish and wantonly needless practice of lancing, &c., and searing, the thick coarse hair of the bridle in the poor dumb creature's mouth; all which being common practices with numbers of the city carters.—Also, why are great unfeeling lay-soundrels, of a size and weight fit for a constable's profession, permitted to sit in small carts (particularly return empty milk-cans), which are drawn perhaps by only one small dog, and allowed to whip the poor wretch to a torturing speed along our streets. Are we men and Christians, and do we allow these things? Shame on the legislators of the land, if laws have not been framed to remove a moral evil (and it is easily proven to be one) such as this; and if such laws are in existence, then greater shame be those into whose hands their enforcement is entrusted, be they Magistrate or Man Jack!

COMMERCIAL.

MONTREAL MARKETS.

Friday, November 18th.

Ashes.—We have to note a further reduction in the price of Pots—small bills having been sold this week at 27s 3d, and large parcels at 27s 6d to 27s 9d per cwt.

Pot's are scarce and command 6d per cwt, more than pots.—28s per cwt, being usually paid by shippers for good parcels.

Flour—Canadian flour may be quoted at 28s per barrel, at which sales of 1500 barrels transacted yesterday.

The market is decidedly firmer now than it was in the beginning of the week, for several hitherto sold out on Monday and Tuesday at 3s 7d 1-2d to 3s 3d per barrel, on time, and one sale transpired as low as 3s. As soon as the shipping is all engaged, however, the price will in all probability give way again.

Grain.—Very little of any description has been brought to market this week, and prices continue as last quoted.

Sugars.—S. lbs of single refined have been effected this week at 6s 3d, per lb, an' of double at 7s 1d. No alteration to note in Muscovado.

Teas.—The market continues as last quoted.

Exchange.—The banks gave over drawing on London previous to the Englishman being in town, and private sums were brought by parties residing at Quebec, about premium.

NEW YORK MARKETS.

Flour has gone up 1s. today at 6s 1d per cwt. Advances, which is 1s. per cwt.

Wheat.—Sales of 2000 bushels of Gouesse at 13s 6d.

Ashes.—Small sales of both descriptions at yesterday's price, 28s per cwt, and 28s 7d per cwt.

LONDON GRAIN MARKET, October 28.

Since Monday, we have had very fine days; the nights however, have occasionally been wet, with winds; last night was frosty, and today the weather is cold.

Wheat.—In foreign there has been but little business; holders, however, are not at all anxious to sell, as the wheat prices are fully supported. Of English there are no fresh samples at market, and what are available are quite as much money.

Flour.—Both English and foreign in quick sets, an' the latter at high rates; for American, in bond, 3s per barrel is demanded.

STATE OF THE COUNTRY.—The price of wheat, at Market Lane has experienced a further increase, this yesterday being from 1s 2d to 2s a quarter, advance of three long weeks. In looking over the circumstances of the different factors we observe that most of these describe the supply of wheat as very small. None is quoted from the North of England or Scotland. The quality of most of the samples was inferior. It is a strange state of things at this season.—Morning Chronicle. Oct. 19.

NOTE. It is hereby given that it is the intention of the Government at once to take the necessary steps for settling the Kennebec Road in conformity to the Provincial Statute & Geo. 4th 31.

Lot of 50 Acres of Land each will be £. id. or £. each of the rest.

Settlers 21 years of age and upwards who have never obtained a grant of Land from Government, may obtain a Lot of 50 acres on the following conditions.

1st.—They are to make application to the Emigrant Agent, at Quebec, or to the resident Agent, whenever they shall be ready to become residents, on the tract to be granted.

2nd.—Upon giving a satisfactory account of their means of providing for themselves until a Crop can be raised from the ground, they will receive a Ticket from the Emigrant Agent entitling them to locate the land.

3rd.—Upon application to the resident Agent in the first place he will give a statement to the Emigrant Agent, of the applicant's age, family, and means of settlement, upon which it, if approved, authority for location will issue.

4th.—The Tickets issued will be useless to any but the applicants, and unless presented to the resident Agent within one month from the day they will not be received by him. Any person who shall receive a Ticket, and who shall not proceed to the Settlement within one month, or who, having been placed upon land there, shall abandon it, will be considered as having lost all claim to receive land.

5th.—Settlers will be required to clear and plow once under Crop, one third of the land located, and to reside on the land until this settlement duty is performed, and after one third of the grant shall have been cleared and under Crop, the settler shall be entitled to his Paid, free of expense.

6th.—The Settlement duty is required to be done within four years from the day of the Ticket.

7th.—Settlers who are under the necessity of being temporarily absent from their Locations, will apply to the resident Agent & stating the length of their intended absence, and the reason for it, which will be entered on the Agent's Book if the reason for absence seems sufficient, and any person who shall absent himself without being permitted to do so by the Agent
