THE PURSUIT ABANDONED

British Cavalry Ordered to Return From Pursuit of the Khalifa.

Connaught Lays the Corner-Stone of the Dam at the First Nile Cataract.

Russian Troops Pouring Into Port Arthur.

Cairo, Egypt, Feb. 13.—According to dispatches from Omdurman, the British cavalry which has been in pursuit of the Khalifa Abdullahi has been ordered to return for the present, the season being unfavorable. The same dispatches announce that there is no friction of any sort on the frontier of the Sudan and Abyssinia, all relations between Menelik and the British representatives being most friendly.

CONNAUGHT ON THE NILE.

Assuan, Feb. 13.—The Duke of Connaught, third son of Queen Victoria, has laid the corner-stone of the great reservoir dam at the top of the first cataract here, in the presence of Fakhr Pasha, minister of public works, and other notables. The length of the dam is a mile and a quarter. It will be 30 feet wide at the base and 30 feet high. It will raise the level of the Nile for 140 miles.

RUSSIAN TROOPS IN CHINA.

Hong Kong, Feb. 13.—The Russian Government is pouring troops into Port Arthur and Tientsin. On the ground that the force now garrisoning the place is too small in view of the apparent ascent of the inhabitants of Liao Tung Peninsula, who have within the last two months risen up against the Russians in thirteen towns and districts.

No less than 9,000 men have landed at Port Arthur, within a month, and it is intended to add 25,000 more before the end of the Chinese first moon, making a full army corps of some 35,000, in addition to the garrisons of 15,000 men for Port Arthur and 8,000 for Tientsin.

TO BRING PLANETS NEARER.

Paris, Feb. 13.—An English company has recently ordered from the Societe Francaise de Telescopes de 1900 an enormous telescope lens, to cost \$400,000, and to be delivered in 1901.

The English company wished it to be more powerful than the one which is being made for the Paris Exposition in 1900, but the French company would only accept an order for one similar to the exposition lens, declaring that it is reserving for French astronomy a more powerful lens, which will be ready in 1902.

INFLUENZA IS EPIDEMIC.

Christiana, Feb. 13.—There are now, according to the official returns, 2,342 cases of influenza in this city. Last week the deaths from the disease numbered 108.

Stockholm, Feb. 13.—Last week 3,190 cases of influenza were reported here. The disease was fatal in 229 cases.

Berlin, Feb. 13.—Influenza is raging to an unprecedented degree in Berlin. The incessant rains increase mortality, hinder convalescence, and breed new cases of the disease. Several schools have been closed for want of pupils or enough teachers to carry on the work, while in the city teachers' seminary all the students except 15 are sick.

KILLED BY BLACK DAMP.

Diamondville, Wyo., Feb. 13.—John T. Russell and E. T. Wright were killed last night by black damp in the Diamondville mine. Ten others were overcome, but were rescued in time to save their lives.

THE SPORT OF WIND AND WAVE

Steamship Bulgarian Drifting Helpless.

British Steamer Arno Gons to the Bottom—13 of Her Crew Probably Drowned—Stormy Passage of the Fuerst Bismarck.

Ponta Del Gada, Azores Islands, Feb. 12.—The British tank steamer Weehawken, from Philadelphia, Jan. 27, for Hull, has arrived here with 25 passengers from the Hamburg-American liner Bulgarian, from New York, Jan. 28, for Hamburg. The Weehawken reports the Bulgarian helpless 800 miles from the Azores. Nothing is known here as to the fate of the other passengers.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN TAKEN OFF.

London, Feb. 12.—It is understood here tonight that the Hamburg-American liner Bulgarian, which is reported drifting helpless 800 miles from the Azores, carried 90 passengers. According to a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Ponta Del Gada, the 25 members of the Bulgarian's company on board the Weehawken are women and children. The rest of the passengers and the crew could not be taken off, owing to the heavy weather.

122 PEOPLE ON BOARD.

New York, Feb. 12.—Mr. Emil L. Boas, the general agent of the Hamburg-American Line in this city, says that the Bulgarian had 47 passengers aboard. Her crew numbered 75, under command of Capt. Schmidt. She had on board 107 horses and 5,000 tons of freight, most of it being grain. The Bulgarian, M. Boas, says, has no cabin accommodations for passengers, and that, therefore, all the passengers aboard were in the steerage. They were mostly Germans and from all parts of the United States.

THE ARNO LOST—THIRTEEN PERSONS MISSING.

London, Feb. 13.—The British steamer Arno, while bound from Shields to Portsmouth, foundered in a gale off Nab lightship. The captain and three men landed here yesterday. The rest are missing. One of the men had his leg broken, and none for a time were able to give any coherent account of their experiences, so terrible had been their sufferings. The Arno was wrecked within hailing distance of the lightship and sank rapidly. Three boats were launched, but the captain's boat was found waterlogged, and it is doubtful whether the others could live in the boiling sea. After the boat of the survivors was stove in, they were literally cast ashore. After three o'clock in the morning they were lying helpless by the police and coastguards.

ABANDONED IN THE ICE.

Grand Haven, Mich., Feb. 13.—The steamer Moran has been abandoned in mid-sea, and there is no chance to release the vessel until the present cold snap moderates and the ice softens. Three members of the crew walked ashore on the ice, and report that the rest of the crew had been taken on board the steamer Naomi. The Naomi, after a hard struggle with the ice, reached here with the rescued crew of the Moran. It appears from their story that the Moran stove a big hole in her bow while bucking the ice last Thursday. All efforts to save the doomed vessel proved fruitless. Tons of her cargo were thrown overboard. The Naomi hurried to the Moran's rescue. She tried to tow the Moran, but the effort had to be abandoned on account of the ice.

New York, Feb. 13.—The Hamburg-American steamer Fuerst Bismarck here arrived from Genoa, after the longest passage the steamer ever made across the Atlantic, and one of the roughest in the experience of her officers. The voyage from Gibraltar to New York was made in twelve days and seven hours. Terrific gales were encountered from Feb. 1 to Feb. 7, enroute.

Over the vessel frequently sweeping over the seas, smashing rails, doors and other woodwork. Several ventilators were swept overboard and two boats were carried from their chocks.

SAILOR WASHED OVERBOARD.

On Feb. 3, Otto Lohse, a sailor, was washed overboard and lost. For five days the great steamer rolled violently and flooded heavily until the decks here were violently ill. The spray froze as it fell, covering the boats, hull, bridges and rigging far up the masts, with a coating of ice. The Fuerst Bismarck appeared like a veritable iceberg. The crew had to break the ice from the decks and gangways in order to land the passengers.

THE GERMANIC'S EXPERIENCE.

The White Star steamer Germanic (Capt. McKinstry), which left Liverpool on Feb. 1, arrived after a most tempestuous and stormy voyage. From the time of leaving Queenstown until arrival the Germanic encountered a succession of heavy gales and high seas.

GALE OFF NEWFOUNDLAND.

St. Johns, Nfld., Feb. 13.—A frightful northwest gale raged over the whole island. The coast mail steamer Virginia Lake was unable to round Cape Race in the teeth of the wind, and had to enter the harbor to avoid foundering. The storm will seriously endanger the new Canadian liner Gasparie, which, when last heard from, was fast in an ice floe in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The gale will likely break up the ice.

OUTSIDE NEW YORK HARBOR.

New York, Feb. 12.—At a late hour today none of the big liners had reached their docks. A strong north wind was blowing throughout the day, and this may keep some of them off the coast. The list of those due includes the Cunarder, Etruria, the Alsatia, Anchorage, Paris, Le Bretagne, and the Spaarndam. The Hamburg-American liner Adria, chartered by the International Navigation Company, arrived last night from Antwerp, after

a most tempestuous voyage, during which Capt. Von Levitzow was thrown in the cabin passage way and killed.

ANSWERED IN THE NEGATIVE.

London, Feb. 11.—In the House of Commons, Mr. Brodrick, parliamentary secretary to the foreign office, denied that the government had received any communication from the United States Government proposing the exemption of private property at sea from capture in time of war.

In response to a question whether the government had committed itself in any way on the question of accepting the invitation of the Czar of Russia to take part in the proposed international disarmament scheme, Mr. Brodrick said that the suggestions made in a second circular on the subject were under consideration by the government. No reply had as yet been sent to Russia, and no statement in regard to the matter could be made at present.

Mr. Balfour said in reply to a question that no arrangement had been made in reference to Cecil Rhodes' proposal that the government guarantee the project of constructing a line of railway from the Cape of Good Hope to Cairo.

SWEPT BY GREAT GALES

Immense Damage Done by High Tides in the British Isles.

Thousands of Acres of Land Covered by a High Tidal Wave.

Prince Bonaparte, Chief of the Old Branch of the Family, Dead—Cotton Spinners May Strike.

London, Feb. 13.—A heavy gale swept the British Islands Sunday and has continued today, causing floods at many points. Rivers have overflowed their banks, railways have been submerged, and there have been numerous casualties along the coast. At Newport, Monmouthshire, a high tidal wave leaped over the sea wall, submerging thousands of acres and the low-lying portions of the town. One man was drowned.

The unusually high tide did serious damage to the sea walls at Ryde and Sandown, on the Isle of Wight.

A coal lighter has foundered off Gromer, Norfolk county, and five of her crew were drowned. The vessel was feared that the loss of the British steamer Arno, which foundered in the gale off Nab lightship, will prove a very serious disaster. The Arno was wrecked within hailing distance of the lightship, and sank rapidly. No word has been received of the thirteen members of the crew, who are missing.

PRINCE BONAPARTE DEAD.

Rome, Feb. 13.—Prince Napoleon Charles Gregoire Jacques Philippe Bonaparte, third son of Prince Lucien Bonaparte, Prince of Canino and chief of the older branch of the Bonaparte family, is dead. The late Prince Napoleon Charles Bonaparte, who was born in Rome, Feb. 5, 1815, succeeded to the headship of the older branch of the house of Bonaparte in 1895, on the death of Cardinal Prince Lucien Bonaparte, his brother. He took part in the expedition to establish Mexican monarchy, with the Austrian archduke Maximilian as king. In 1859 he married Princess Marie Christine, daughter of Prince Jean-Nepomucene Ruspoli, and leaves two daughters and three sisters.

COTTON SPINNERS' STRIKE.

THREATENED.

There is much unrest among the cotton spinners in Lancashire. The spinners have demanded a 2 per cent increase in wages, in reply to which the employers have asked the men to wait six months. This is taken as tantamount to a refusal, and the spinners' union is favorable to ordering a strike. The world would involve \$3,000,000 men and leave 17,000,000 spindles idle. A meeting of the dissatisfied has been called for Feb. 18.
